Whereas, we remember well the loving service, the friendly counsel and the cheering smile of our sister who has passed beyond, and

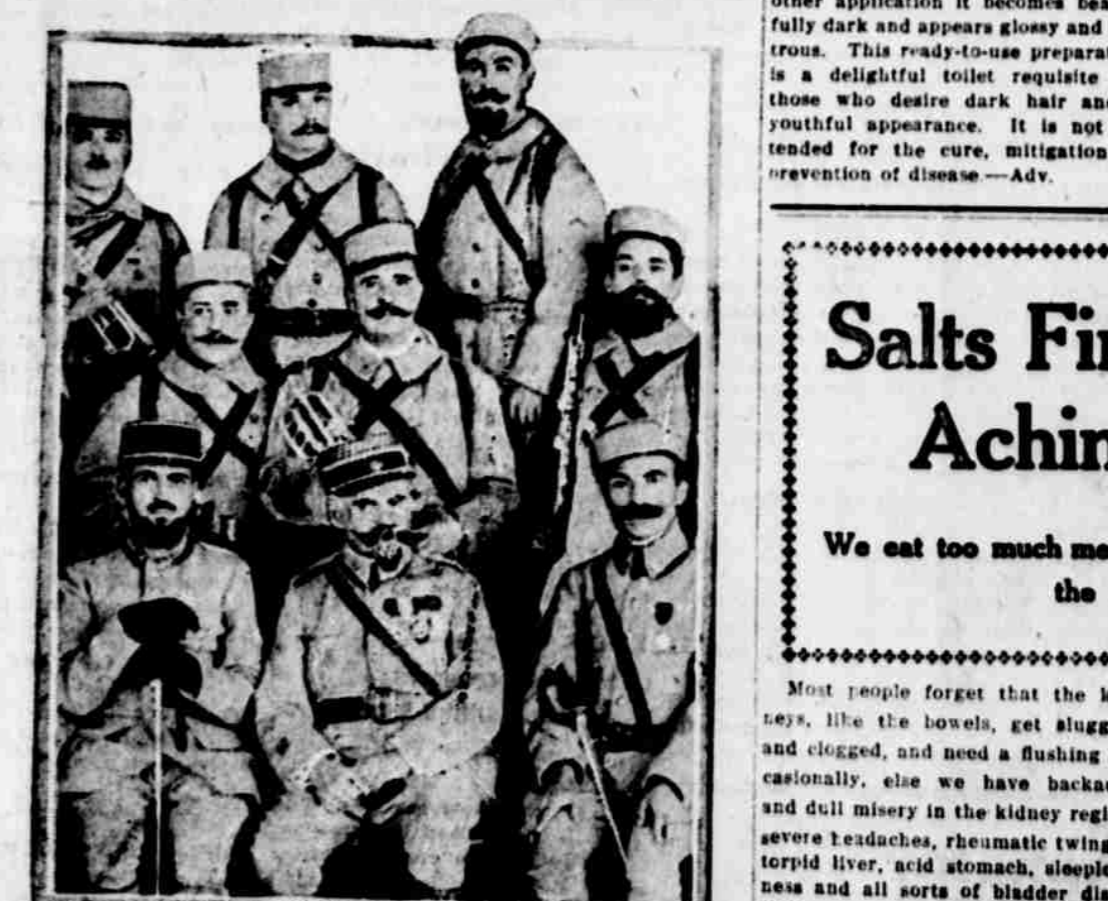
