PROGERMANISM

PRESIDENT OF STATE MUSIC ASSOCIATION DELIVERED INSPIRING ADDRESS ON SUBJECT OF AMERICAN MUSIC

Los Angeles, July 11.—Keeping pro-Germanism out of the public schools by putting American music in, was urged here today by Mrs. Abbie Norton Jamieson, president of the California State Music Teacher's association, in an address before the opening session of that organization's four day annual convention.

"Only the most loyal and inspiring American music should be taught the boys and girls of the state's educational institutions," Mrs. Jamieson said. "If there are any text books in use that contain German songs, those compositions should be removed."

Loyalty was the outstanding feature of the meeting. The music at a concert under the auspices of the organization was strictly and patriotically American in both its immediate and its ultimate purpose, as the proceeds were to be devoted to the purchase of bonds of the Fourth Liberty Loan to be floated next fall.

Other concerts for the same purpose are scheduled for later convention days.

Praise for young musicians who have joined the colors was generously given and the declaration was made that the musical standard of the United States army was at least the equal of that of any other fighting force.

The increase in the numerical strength of military bands was to be discussed.

Mrs. Jamieson said the federal government approved the holding of the convention, press sanction having been obtained from William G. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury, because some member questioned the propriety of the gathering on account of the expense incurred.
