FOREST PIEL TELLS ABOUT N. Y. VISIT

FORMER MEMBER OF HERALD STAFF ON WAY TO FRANCE TELLS OF WONDERS IN NEW YORK CITY—BIG PARADE

An interesting letter from Forest Piel, now about ready to sail with the ambulance corps for France, has just been received by his mother, Mrs. A. W. Piel, describing his visit to New York, with Ralph Carter, another well known Klamath Falls boy.

The letter, in part, follows: "We have been here two days now and are rapidly getting ready for sailing. New clothing is being issued, including steel helmets, and our

hair is being cut to three-fourths of an inch in length.

"We may sail any day now, but none of us know exactly when. The East is very much hotter than the West, and the heat is close and oppressive, causing lassitude and some loss of appetite. The water is very poor, not cold, and the people have no 'pep' whatever.

"We are 18 miles from New York City, so Ralph Carter and I visited it yesterday, returning at 5 a. m. this day.

"It is such a vast stretch of sky scrapers that one cannot grasp a definite idea of its size; if you ask someone to tell you of it you very soon become confused and overwhelmed with the names of so many centers of attraction. I know Portland and Seattle pretty well, but you could lose them both in one corner of New York.

"There are four levels of transportation, two beneath the surface, one on the surface, and one elevated.

"Ralph and I got on an elevated train at 23rd street and rode nine miles between skyscrapers, when our guide pointed back to the Metropolitan tower, from where we started, and said it was nine miles. It looked three. The town extended far beyond it in both directions.

"Our guide was a cigar store proprietor who took a liking to us when we bought cigars. He got on the elevated with us, showing us much of the town, took us to his apartments, where his wife served a fine supper and he furnished 25 cent cigars.

"When we left we got in an elevator and dropped 260 feet below

the earth to step into an electric train that took us under the city and under the East river to Brooklyn bridge, a distance of 15 miles, in fifteen minutes. There we changed trains without leaving the underground and rode ten miles to Coney Island in as many minutes.

"Coney Island is a bathing beach with blocks upon blocks of concessions, shows, entertainments, dance halls and saloons. You may like to know that the underground ride cost a dime.

"Yesterday was July 4th, so we saw an immense parade up Fifth avenue lasting from nine a. m. until seven p. m. Besides the innumerable floats, 110,000 persons of alien birth, representing 42 different nationalities, marched in the parade under the banner 'One Flag, One Country, One Ideal.' At 3 p. m. at the height of the parade, a fleet of 24 army airplanes flew over the city in battle formation, dropping 3,000,000 copies of President Wilson's speech at Mount Vernon, which was being delivered at that exact moment.

"At 8 o'clock in the evening, many theaters were showing movies of the parade."

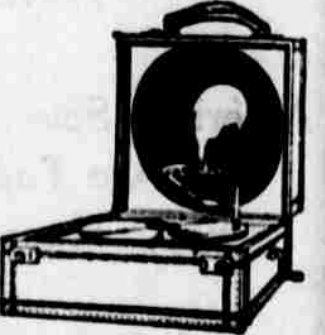

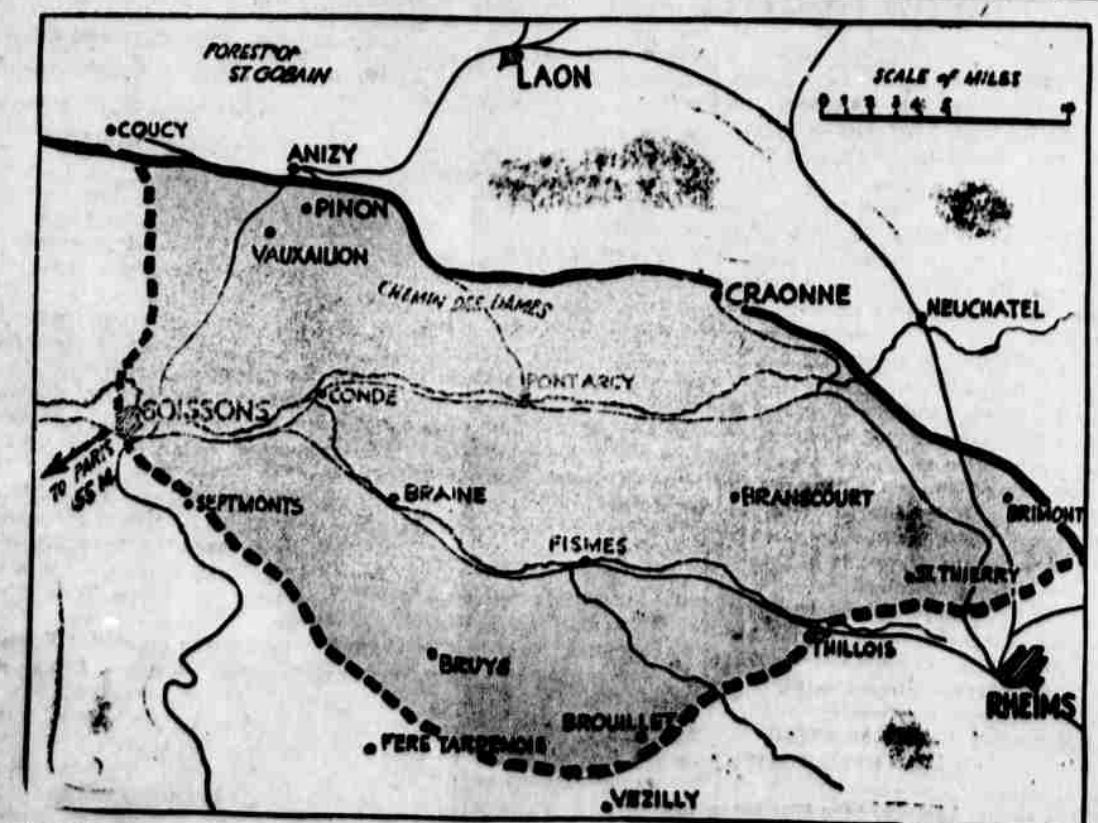

Ground That the Germans Have Gained in Their Latest Assault



In their new assault on the allied lines over the old battleground of the Aisne the Germans have gained ground over a 40 mile front from Coucy on the northwest to Brimont on the southwest. At its deepest line this strip is about 20 miles wide. They began the attack on the hills of Chemin des Dames and have advanced in the center to the neighborhood of Vesilly. The most important town so far taken is Soissons. From there they are within 55 miles of Paris.
