Save Scraps and Make Explosives

Philadelphia, July 15.—Save the unedible scraps from the table for making explosive charges for 75 millimeter guns.

The food administration here has issued this appeal to housewives for increased efficiency. Kitchen and table refuse, it is urged, should be kept in a separate container from other house refuse and free from foreign matter.

Statistics furnished by the food administration show that one ton of garbage supplies enough glycerine to make the explosive charge for 14 75-millimeter shells, enough "fatty acid" to manufacture 75 pounds of soap, fertilizer to grow eight bushels

of wheat and scores of other materials essential in the manufacture of munitions.

The garbage wasted in 24 large cities not utilizing garbage is estimated to be equal to about four and a half millions of pounds of nitroglycerine in a year, or about \$5,000,000.

"Shock Troops" Help Hold Harvest Line

Washington, July 15.—"Shock troops" are busy in American wheat fields, as well as on the western battle front. When the German war lords command an advance at any cost, shock troops are sent forward to buy yards of ground with thousands of lives, but the American agricultural "shock troops" advance in a different manner. They are town men who have volunteered to help farmers cut and shock their wheat, and thus are doing their part in making the battle line firm.

Here are two instances reported to the United States department of agriculture, of how towns and cities are helping to meet the need for harvest workers on American farms:

A South Dakota county has organized all its towns. When labor is needed all business places close early and the town men go in automobiles to every quarter of the county.

When they come to fields cut but not shocked they get out and shock, and then proceed to other fields needing them. They don't talk about pay or who is doing the work. "If the farmer wants to donate the money which we would spend for labor to the Red Cross that is his business," says a letter from South Dakota, "and I think that is where most of the money will go."

"Shock troops" are cutting and shocking wheat in Warrick county, Indiana, also. Volunteer business men, clerks and laborers in the towns finish their town work and then are taken in automobiles to help the farmers. In one evening forty men shocked more than 50 acres of wheat.

These forces have been organized thru co-operation of farm help specialists of the United States department of agriculture, county agents, county councils of defense and other bodies.

Food Commission Gives Food Basis for System

London, June 26.—Correspondence of The Associated Press.—As a basis for calculating the amount of food which must be provided for the human system, the Inter-Allied Scientific Food commission has found that an average man of 154 pounds, working eight hours a day requires food having an energy value of 3,300 calories.

The commission consists of representatives of the United States, Italy, France, Belgium and Great Britain, and its purpose is to consider the food problem of the Allies from a scientific point of view and in agreement with the Inter-Allied executives to make proposals to the Allied governments.

The commission agreed that, in event it should become impossible to supply 3,300 calories of food, a reduction of ten per cent could be suffered for some time without injury to health. The minimum ration of fat for the average man determined upon was 2 5-8 ounces a day.

The commission recommended that a uniform average milling extraction of 85 per cent for wheat be adopted throughout the Allied countries, but this extraction may vary from 80 per cent in summer to 90 per cent in winter. The commission held sessions in London, Paris and Rome.
