

Making Peace With Germany Is Unpleasant

London, July 5.—(By Associated Press Correspondent Recently in Roumania).—The business of making peace with Germany is not a pleasant one for persons who have to conduct the negotiations. The Roumanian delegates who went down from Jassy in March at the invitation of the Germans found no warm welcome or pleasant hospitality awaiting them at Bucharest. "We were treated as less than the dust," said one of the delegates in picturesque Roumanian metaphor, on his return to Jassy. These were merely the preliminary and informal negotiations. The formal party did not begin until some days later. The delegation which undertook these preliminary conversations was headed by M. Papilianu, former Roumanian minister to Constantinople, and his associates included representatives of the principal political parties.

Altho they had come to Bucharest at the personal invitation of the German commander in chief, Field Marshal von Mackensen could give them

Skull Buried Thousands Of Years Is Found

Palladas, Colo., July 16.—Archaeological researchers are expected here in considerable numbers following the discovery of a human skull the features of which are in a wonderful state of preservation. It was found in a vein of coal where it had been imbedded for centuries, on Virginia Mesa, three miles east of here. The skull was uncovered in a 79-foot prospect mine being opened by Dr. A. E. De Neque.

Allied War Exhibition Being Held In U. S.

San Francisco, July 16.—France, England, Belgium, Italy and the Americans under the command of General John J. Pershing have combined to present to the American people a comprehensive exhibit of war trophies. This Allied War exhibition now being held here and is attracting thousands of visitors daily. Eventually it will be shown in all of the large cities of the nation. It is a government exhibit under the direction of the national committee on public information. While the itinerary of the exhibit, after it leaves San Francisco, has not as yet been completed, Los Angeles, Denver, Kansas City and Chicago probably will be among the early points in the schedule. Practically everything shown is war material captured from the enemy, including Germans, Turks, Austro-Hungarians and Bulgarians. The fact that it takes approximately 25 freight cars to transport the articles from point to point will indicate the impossibility of attempt to enumerate what may be seen. The exhibit includes objects of interest from a tank captured airplanes and submarine to steel trench helmets and iron crosses. All manner of cannon are shown and practically all of them show the scars of battle which took place before they fell into the hands of the Allied armies. Among these is a German mounted anti-airplane gun. Its condition bears every evidence that an allied shell must have struck in close proximity. Allied soldiers doubtless spent some time in collect-

ing and putting together the pieces. Huge pieces of ordnance with the barrels burst open where a premature explosion of the shell occurred bear testimony of their explosive force. One German bombing plane is fairly riddled from the effects of a barrage fire. There is scarcely a part of it but what is pierced and torn by shells and bullets. It is not stated whether the men operating it were killed or captured. It probably is taken for granted that the appearance of the airplane automatically answers the question.

Veterans of the war who have been invalided home because their injuries will prevent their further participation in the war, are on hand to explain to visitors the various points concerning the exhibits. Not the least interesting part of their talks are the occasional personal experiences which they inject.

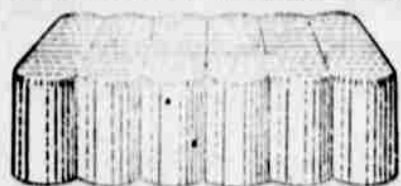
