

Livestock Situation Was Never Brighter

Chicago, July 16.—The American livestock situation, as viewed by the National Livestock exchange, after a survey of the conditions at the 60 big markets and the great producing areas, never was brighter from the standpoint of the producer, and the consumer, on the other hand, need have little fear of increased prices during the fall and winter. In fact, a slight reduction in beef prices may be expected by winter, while pork and mutton prices probably will see little change, in the opinion of C. E. Heinemann, secretary of the exchange.

The splendid response to the government's request for increased production, the phenomenal reduction in losses from preventable disease, war measures for the producers' protection, improved railroad service, and especially to western markets, and the

satisfactory condition of most of the ranges, combine to make the outlook unusually promising, according to Mr. Heinemann.

The cattle increase, based on exchange reports from 59 markets and covering the first five months of the year, is 12.4 per cent over the corresponding period of 1917. Officials of the organization say that late reports indicate that the increase of 2,871,000 hogs estimated January 1, by the department of agriculture will be far surpassed, and sheep receipts for the first five months increased \$97,237, or 6.3 per cent over the same period of 1917. The western lamb increase

alone, Mr. Heinemann reckons, will be 1,600,000 head over last year.

Establishment of shipping zones, which make a five-day market, long sought shippers, and eliminates the Monday market "glut" that formerly caused wide price swings, together with the bureau of markets' recent action in taking over the work of handling estimated receipts, have been big factors in stimulating confidence of the producers, Mr. Heinemann declares. The licensing system, effective July 25, under which packers will operate, also had an encouraging effect upon producers, he says.

Cigarettes Wonderful Comfort to Soldiers

Paris, July 16.—Anti-cigarette reformers would get scant consideration from the medical corps of the United States army, according to major surgeons stationed in hospitals along the front, some of whom say that the cigaret produces a relaxation of the wounded and the men just out of the trenches that no medicine could possibly produce.

"I have seen men borne in on stretchers as staggering in on their feet with their faces contorted, show-

ing either physical pain or mental strain from their grim experiences in the trenches, relax, smile and ask for something to eat after having a whiff of a cigaret," said a surgeon in charge of a casualty clearing station.

"The effect of the cigaret is wonderful. It certainly is not medicinal for the action is too quick. As soon as the lads take their first 'whiff' they seem eased and relieved of their agony."

THE EXTERMINATION OF GAME BIRDS PREDICTED

Spokane, July 16.—Extermination of game birds is foreseen by Joseph Stingle, deputy state game warden, unless prompt steps are taken for their protection. He says:

"Many years ago hunters killed millions of game birds each season. Today one may travel from coast to coast without as much as seeing some of the well known game birds. Shall the birds we have left suffer the same untimely fate?"

"We have a few who call themselves sportsmen who still encourage the backwoodsman and farmers to kill game birds and game animals for commercial purposes at all seasons of

the year by purchasing game from them.

"The closed season laws are the most important of all. They protect the birds, animals and fish during and after breeding periods. The killing of the female during such times means the loss of an entire family. Besides, all breeding animals and certainly their young, are practically defenseless and need all the protection man can give them."
