

Huns Refuse to Give Up Old Clothes

Amsterdam, July 19.—The "voluntary" surrender of worn clothing for the benefit of war workers in Germany is turning out a complete failure. The brief initial rush which was motivated by expectations of obtaining exemption from the threatened forcible emptying of ward robes, soon died down. Berlin, which was expected to yield 40,000 suits, has not supplied half that number, and the same tale comes from all other centers. The period for bringing in the clothing had to be extended everywhere and bonuses given as at Schoeneberg, where every old suit reaped a reward of a jar of real honey or a packet of pudding powder. Essen is the first town where steps have already been taken for an official inspection of private ward robes but others will inevitably follow. In the meantime, there are many indignant letters in the newspapers from citizens who patriotically denied themselves articles of clothing and which they were now told are not good enough for munition workers. Complaint is made that the latter earn much more money and live in better style than the disappointed benefactors.

ASHLAND BAKER IS FIRST TO BE PENALIZED

Portland, July 19.—Ben Zurnstein, proprietor of the Bon Ton bakery at Ashland, is the first baker to be penalized by the state food administration for violation of the United States food administration regulations. Zurnstein was summoned before

W. B. Ayer, state food administrator this week charged with having failed to make the weekly reports, with failing to weigh the substitutes used in his bakery, and with failing to use the required amount of substitutes in bread and pastry. The baker admitted his guilt, upon which Mr. Ayer suspended his license and ordered the doors of his business closed for one week.

Congressman and Violinist Stir Italy



Captain F. H. NEW MILL INDUSTRY TO START

The Chiloquin Lumber company, incorporated by H. W. Poole, J. E. Hall, A. E. Johnson and R. W. Torrey has been formed, and will construct a mill in the near future on a site near the junction of Sprague and Williamson rivers. The capacity for the new industry will be 40,000 feet per day. It is expected that the mill will be completed and in operation some time this fall. The mill machinery is now on the way, timbers for the plant being cut and a grade being prepared for the rails.

England Impressed By Masses of U. S. Troops

With the American Army in England, June 30.—Correspondence of the Associated Press.—America's increased flow of troops into France has brought to the English public a realization of the magnitude of the movement. The comings and goings of force after force have impressed the residents of England with the might of their new ally as nothing else has. Since the first days of May the growing volume has been apparent. Wave after wave of American troops have moved forward from the ports of arrival thru the country to rest camps and from them on to the ports of embarkation with only enough pauses to get the sea wobble out of the men's legs. The number of rest camps, the name that has come to be applied to what really are concentration camps, has been increased; and British traffic men are finding themselves heavily taxed to maintain uninterrupted the shuttle of shipping between England and France. The British are doing that part of the work and American officers have been high in their praise of the efficiency displayed. Americans are in command of the men when they land and are responsible for them in the temporary camps and up to the point of going to the piers where ships are waiting to carry them to France, but the transportation both across the country and overseas is in the hands of men who have been moving the British millions since 1914.
