

Zumbrum Describes Baseball In England

A most interesting letter has been received from Charles (Chuck) Zumbrum, who resided on a ranch in the Fort country for several years, and during that time was an idol of the baseball fans who patronized the Klamath diamond.

He is now with the 9th Aero Squadron, at present stationed in England. "I wish to express my thanks and gratitude for the Klamath papers. The last issue of the while I was in bed, which made them doubly welcome, and I received another bundle about two weeks ago."

"I must tell you the reason I am an inmate of this hospital before going further with this letter. My capacity for getting minor hurts while playing baseball seems to have followed me across the water. I got spiked on the right leg just below the knee while playing second base for our team against a neighboring aerodrome. Seemed only a bump to me so did not give it much consideration until it finally got so bad it was impossible to 'carry on' with my daily duties. The M. O. took one look at it, pronounced it acute abscess and sent me here. Arrived thirteen days ago and have been in bed ever since. Nothing serious and will soon be out again. This is a British hospital with British medical officers and nurses. The treatment is good and so far I haven't a thing to complain about. I am the only 'Yank' in this ward; on either side of me are Australians, New Zealanders, Canadians, Scotch, Irish, Welsh and English soldiers. Naturally, we have many conversations and discussions relative to the merits of our different countries. I am anxious to get out of the hospital for the 4th of July in drawing near and we have a series of ball games scheduled for the championship of this section, and it behooves me to get out in time to play. We have a fine team and have visited several of the large English towns, playing to large audiences, very few of whom ever witnessed a game of American baseball. Some think it is the ancient game of rounders as played in England decades ago. A bevy of ladies asked me, after the game, which side won the game, those occupying the east side of the diamond or those occupying the west side, and the game was so one-sided a blind man would have known the victory by the noise we made; we won, 13 to 0. We usually play on the best cricket park in the country and the proceeds go to the British Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., Prisoners' War fund, or care of the wounded."

"The English woman is sure doing her bit here. At first it seemed strange to see young girls doing the

work of men, but now no one gives them a passing glance, be they Wrens or Cuacacs, Wrens, Robins, motor drivers, munitionettes, window cleaners or farm laborers. Some dress in a sort of male attire consisting of blouses and loose pants, breeches, or very short skirts, laced breeches, high top boots or leggings. They are doing their various jobs with credit and grand success, thereby relieving many men for the front. I have talked to a number of them and asked them how they liked the change. The majority say they "are fed up with it," which is English for being sick of it, and would rather be back in their former places at home, but no one complains.

"Will you please tell Mrs. Ramsey how grateful I am for her generous box of smokes; also Mrs. Evans for her kindly package. We sure miss them since Uncle Sam declared war on sending boxes to members of the A. E. F."

"Our boys are acquitting themselves with honor and glory in France and we are anxious to be sent over the channel and hope the day is not far distant."

"Have been promoted to sergeant since May 1, after acting as one since leaving the States."
