Lightless Nights Are Again Inaugurated

Washington, July 22—Resumption of "lightless nights," inaugurated last winter to save fuel, will become effective Wednesday it has been announced by the fuel administration. All out door illumination with the exception of necessary street lighting will be discontinued after that date on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week in the New England states, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland and the District of Columbia, and on Monday and Tuesday of each week in the remainder of the United States. Under the regulations announced street lighting will be reduced to that necessary for public safety. Roof gardens and outdoor restaurants and motion picture theaters are not affected by the order.
