Fraudulent Solicitors
Declared In County

That the solicitors for the voca-
tional home school, situated near
Grants Pass, should not be allowed
to collect funds from the public as
they are now doing in the county, is
alleged by prominent residents of
the Bonanza section, who have been
recently visited in behalf of this in-
stitution.

These persons send statements,
signed by the mayor of Grants Pass
to the effect that the enterprise is
fraudulent. The following is offered
in substantiation.

"Notice to public:

We, the undersigned representa-
tives of the Southern Oregon Confer-
ence of Seventh Day Adventists, have
visited the vocational school situ-
ated near Grants Pass. We find
said school owned and controlled by
Mrs. Cora B. Findlay. The home
is represented to be conducted for
the care and education of orphan
children, and the public are solicited
by Mrs. Cora B. Findlay for funds
to conduct said institution. There
are no children in attendance, and
the retiring teachers, Mr. and Mrs.
C. J. Vorkies, are not in harmony
with the methods upon which the
school is conducted and have re-
quested us to state the fact to the
public. We consider the school a
fraud on the public. We do not and
never have endorsed said school, and

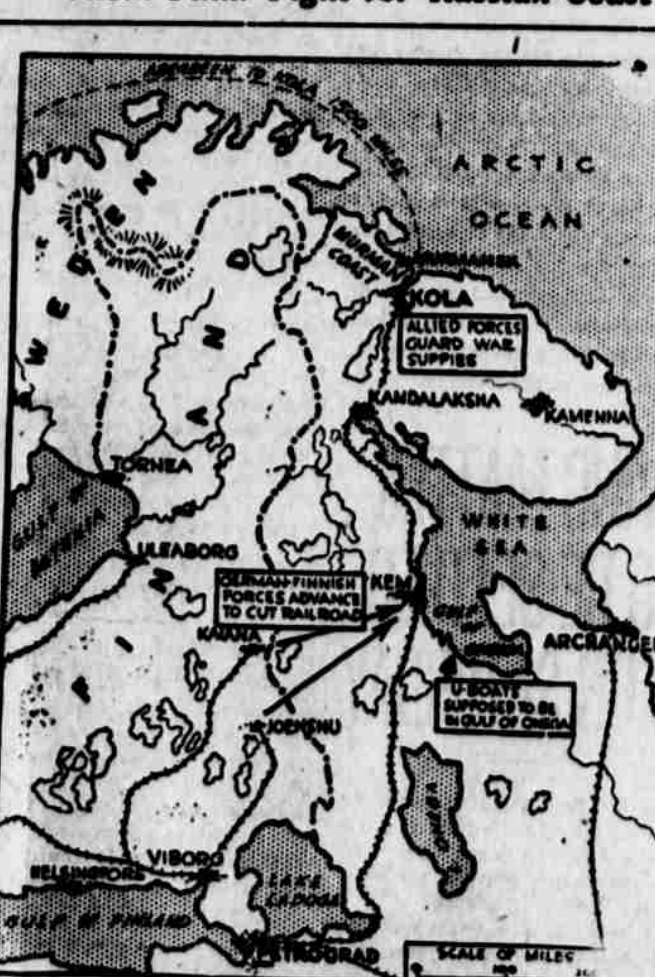

Where Finns Fight for Russian Coast



The Finns, aided and instigated by
the Germans, are trying to get pos-
session of the town of Murmansk and
the coast along the Arctic ocean.
Murmansk is a boom town, the ter-
minal of the railroad which runs
south to Petrograd. It has grown up
because of the enormous business
done there in importations which
once went across the Baltic. The map
shows where the German and Finnish
forces are trying to cut the railroad;
also the Gulf of Onega, where Ger-
man U-boats are believed to be ready
to co-operate with these forces.
