Lieutenant Quentin Roosevelt, the youngest son of Theodore Roosevelt, who was killed by Hun airmen in combat last week. It is believed he was mortally wounded before his

plane dropped inside the German lines. It was hoped that he might be still alive, altho a prisoner, but German aviators have dropped notes inside the American lines confirming his death.

ANTI BOMBARDMENT

INSURANCE LATEST

Paris, July 15.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The German advance has brought into Paris "anti-bombardment insurance." The one company allowed to do such business will insure any given property only against damage from 5,000 shells. If the Germans were to reach a point where their huge 350-centimeter guns could effectively batter Paris, and were to pour 5,000 in without damaging any given piece of property, its owner would have to reinsure against the next 5,000 shells.

The price of the anti-bombardment insurance has gone up to twice what the anti-airplane bomb policies cost. It means just six francs per thousand of insurance if it is furniture and other household goods that is being insured; eight francs per thousand if buildings; and twelve francs per thousand if anything else.

Truth Shot at Huns By Allied Guns

Thousands of specially designed rifles for shooting propaganda over the enemy lines are being used by the Allies. From these rifles grenades are discharged by means of which tracts and pamphlets may be scattered along German trenches with considerable exactitude at a range of more than 300 yards. The nature of the propaganda depends upon the German units in the vicinity, the purpose being always to supply matter that will appeal to the troops from the various parts of Germany. Recent disclosures of Dr. von Muechlon, the former director of the Krupp gun factory, showing the German losses and facts about food conditions in Germany, have been printed in pamphlet form and hurled across the German lines.

To distribute the propaganda at a considerable distance, small balloons made of cloth are used. Each of these lift 20 pounds of propaganda literature and by means of a mechanical device, drops a quarter-pound of these documents at 15-minute intervals.

The radius of action of these balloons in a 25-mile wind would be Hamburg, Berlin, Vienna and Trieste. The balloons travel at a height of from 6000 to 8000 feet. Paper balloons, capable of lifting four pounds, are also used by the American army. These balloons have a radius of 100 miles from the starting point.

The latest devices are planned to employ clockwork for the releasing mechanism, and the use of trench mortars with a cardboard projectile containing literature. Aeroplanes are used occasionally for this purpose, but there are many objections to their employment for this work. Steps are also under consideration for the use of French 75-millimeter guns for the diffusion of propaganda in the enemy lines.

An opportune time for employing grenades and balloons is found to be from 3 to 5 o'clock in the morning when the German soldiers are not being watched by their officers. Many bits of propaganda have already been found in the pockets of German prisoners.

Iron Check Held On German Socialists

New York, July 25.—Repressive measures against Socialists are being put into effect by the German authorities, according to Socialist Deputy Bauer, whose speech before the reichstag on June 4 is quoted in German newspapers received here. Bauer said the Socialist newspapers were being held back at some field post stations by order of high officials, and that complaints made to the war minister were futile. Conditions in Breslau were worse than elsewhere. There, he said, the authorities have forbidden meetings of the members of the Socialist party. The treatment accorded to the pacifists was unworthy and insulting, he said, while the propaganda of the "politics of conquest" is not only allowed but promoted.

"While the Socialist Democrats in the 6th army district in Breslau are absolutely outlawed," declared Bauer, "the Fatherland party is allowed to hold meetings without molestation and enroll new members. Our party secretary in Breslau was disciplined by being drafted into the army because he forwarded the complaints of the wives of soldiers." Bauer demanded that the minister

of war should prevent the general in command of the Breslau district from misusing his authority.

Attempts by labor unions to co-operate in the regulation of wage conditions and working hours met with great opposition, Bauer said. Replying to Bauer's charges, Secretary of the Interior Wallraf said: "In free America the press has to suffer much more."

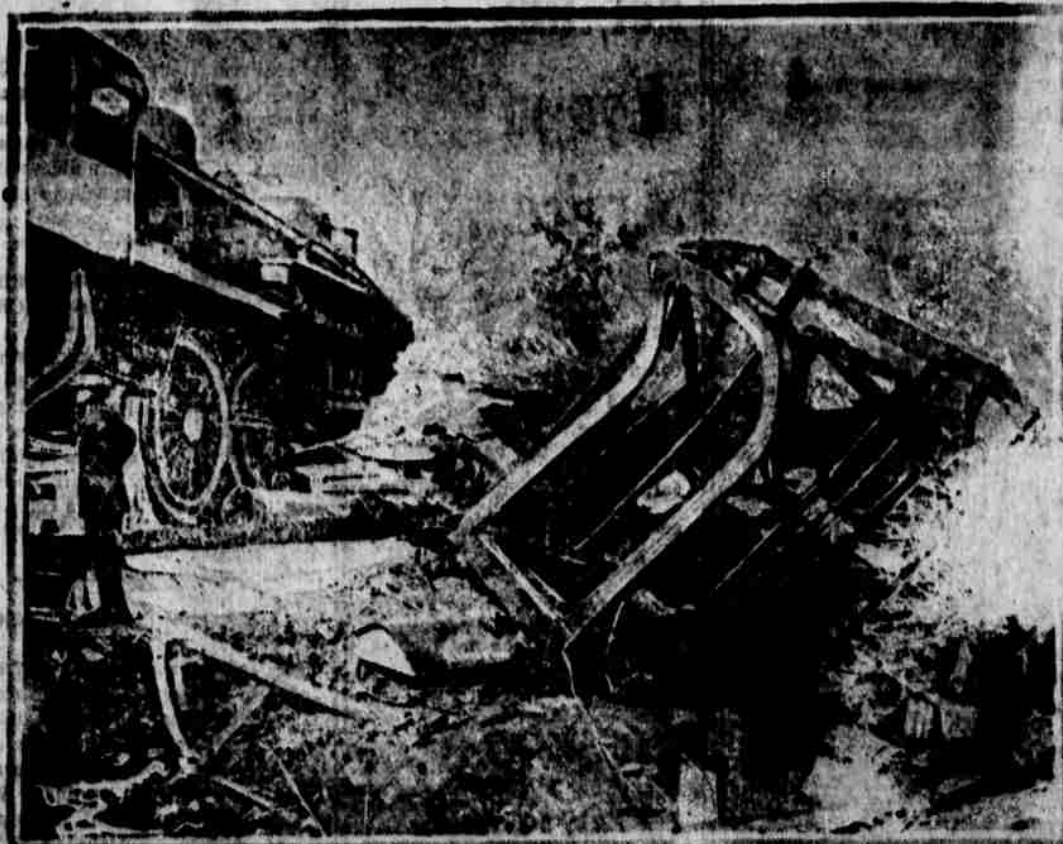
