### Eighteen Churches Unite In Connecticut

New Haven, July 25.—At least a temporary union of churches in 18 Connecticut towns has been accomplished within a year, owing to circumstances resulting from the war, reports a committee of the Connecticut Federation of churches. Denominations joining in the movement were Baptist, Methodist, Congregational, Free Baptist, Lutheran and Independent Methodist. Thirty-seven church organizations now are combining services in 18 buildings. In one town, Baptist and Free Baptist churches under a Methodist minister. The church organization has retained its own officers and adheres to its own denominational beliefs. In most cases the union is consid-

ered a temporary expedient for the period of the war. It is pointed out that the federation of churches is not irrevocable.

### Pressing Need For Tubercular Hospitals

New York, July 25.—Pressing need for immediate increase of hospital facilities to accommodate tuberculous persons, said to number more than 1,000,000 in the United States, is emphasized in a statement issued here today by the National Tuberculosis association. In the ef-

forts to provide such increases, it was said, the expenditure involved would be kept to a minimum during the continuance of the war. The association announced it was co-operating, in this connection, with the Capital Issues committee of the Federal Reserve board.

### Civilian Employes Are Provided With Pensions

Washington, July 25.—The first provision ever made by the government for pensioning civilian employes is contained in the annual lighthouse bill recently approved by President Wilson.

A retirement system is instituted permitting optional retirement at 65 years for those having 30 years active service and making retirement compulsory at 70 years. Pensions will be computed on one-fortieth of the average annual pay during the last five years of service, multiplied by the number of years spent in the lighthouse service or some other

branch of the government which has a retirement system. In any case, the pay shall not be more than thirty fortieths of the annual average.
