

Stock Appropriation Discussed By Indians

Chiloquin, July 26.—The tribal council was in session last Tuesday and Wednesday, discussing various matters affecting the tribe. Supt. J. M. Johnson informed the council that he had received instructions from the commissioner of Indian affairs to make an investigation, with a view towards procuring and issuing live stock to these Indians, who will be prepared to care for stock this coming winter, or whether purchase of farm equipment and improvements on the allotments will be necessary. It appears from the instructions of the commissioner that the superintendent will be the sole judge as to the competency of individuals making application for his share of the appropriation of \$400,000, as to whether he will be deemed competent to handle stock, farm equipment or improvements on his allotment. The above mentioned appropriation, made by congress, if not expended before the fiscal year, ending June 30, 1919, will revert to the treasury of the United States, according to the interpretation of the law by the Indian bureau.

There will be no cash distribution but there will be purchased stock, fruits, grain, farm equipment and necessary improvements on allotments.

Whether or not all of the funds now available will be expended depends largely upon the attitude of the commissioner of Indian affairs, upon recommendations received from the superintendent.

The tribal council paid Mr. Edward B. Ashurst, who has left to enter the service, a glowing tribute for the much appreciated services he has rendered since he came here as an employee of the government to take charge of the stock industry of the Klamath Reservation.

RECEPTION GIVEN TO DEPARTING OFFICIAL

A very interesting reception was given July 26th by the Indians, in honor of Edward B. Ashurst, who has been called in the last draft.

The Reservation band played for the occasion, while Messrs. Chas. S. Hood, Seldon E. Kirk, Mr. Hutto, the Reservation farmer, Jas. S. Hall, and C. Kirk made some very interesting addresses, praising Mr. Ashurst and wishing him Godspeed.

After a short program a wrist watch was presented by the Indians and friends, in token of his untiring efforts in the interests of the Klamath Indians.

Mr. Ashurst has the reputation of being one of the hardest working employees since the establishment of the Reservation in 1871.

The Indians regret very much to see Mr. Ashurst leave as they are losing in him one who worked vigorously for the best interests of the Indians.
