Hun Papers Displeased With Kaiser's Speech

Amsterdam, July 27.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—The Frankfurter Zeitung is not pleased with Emperor William's speech on the occasion of the thirtieth anniversary of his accession. The paper disputes his assertion that the great war is a struggle between two different world-conceptions—on one hand the German conception of right, freedom, honor and morals, and on the other the Anglo-Saxon conception.

"It is not a question of two world conceptions," says the Frankfurter Zeitung, "but of two world powers each possessing might the like of which the world has never seen before."

"The German people were not told on August 4, 1914, they were going out to fight the Anglo-Saxon conception of the world until it conquered. Had that been said, even in veiled terms, the high unity of the will of the German people would have been rent asunder on the first day. For the German did not think of this or that kind of world conception. He thought of the Fatherland's need, of home, and wife, and mother."

ALSACE-LORRAINE NOT FRIENDLY TO GERMAN

New York, July 27.—Realization that the sympathy of the people of Alsace and Lorraine are with France apparently has penetrated to the minds of some of the members of the German reichstag, for according to the Cologne Gazette, Deputy Walstein gave notice in the reichstag in June that "many wrongs must be righted" in those provinces. Feeling of the people in Alsace and Lorraine is no longer so friendly toward Germany as before the war, he declared.
