18. Botany—Practical Botany, by Bergen and Caldwell.
19. Geology—LeConte's Compend of Geology.

ounted to \$419,355.38 and make up the largest item. The receipts fell off \$30,000 from the preceding year, due, according to forestry officials, to labor trouble and the fact that no very large sales, requiring large deposits, were initiated during the year.

Receipts from the sale of grasing privileges amount to \$185,443.07, which was \$17,000 more than in 1917, the largest preceding year. Special use permits brought in \$16,850 and power site permits paid \$11,362. Five trespassers paid \$793. The Whitman National forest in eastern Oregon leads the district with \$97,668 receipts, \$33,445 of which is timber sale business. The Tongass National forest in Alaska ranks second and furnished \$86,519 of the total, of which \$75,130 was derived from timber sales. The Crater National forest in southern Oregon, occupies third place with \$85,035, of which over \$80,000 came from timber business.

In fourth place is the Wallawa National forest, in eastern Oregon, which furnished \$51,330. The Olympic National forest in western Washington contributed \$33,764. The Wallawa forest leads in receipts from grasing permits with \$33,330. The Malheur ranks second with \$30,453. The Fremont had \$16,303 and the Wenabie \$15,233.

The receipts were greater than the cost of administration on eleven National forests in the district in 1918. On a number of others the receipts and cost of administration were nearly equal.

POSTAL AIRPLANE OPERATION IN HALF DOLLAR PER MILE

Washington, July 27.—Postal airplanes are being operated at a cost of approximately 50 cents per mile between Washington, New York and Philadelphia, according to a statement issued by the postal department.

Airplanes of the army training type showed the lowest cost, 43 cents per mile. Gasoline consumption was said to have been low, as the 400-horsepower Liberty motor used 17 gallons per hour.

Siberia, the Great Territory Governed By No One



The enormous territory of Siberia, with nearly 5,000,000 square miles, larger than all Europe, nominally controlled by Russia, but since the overthrow of the czar without any general form of government, is now overrun by brigands and other robber bands, and Cossack-Slovaks, who escaped from Russia. Near Yekaterinburg and Tomsk, and also at Irkutsk, the Cossack-Slovaks have taken possession of the Trans-Siberian railroad, and they may thus control all shipments to the eastern terminal, Vladivostok. They have also reached this place and have, with the naval detachments from allied warships in the harbor, taken possession.
