Russ Leaders Believe Nation Will Come Back

London, July 29.—Conviction that the Bolshevik government of Russia would inevitably be overthrown and that a new Russian government would, first of all, take steps to pay Russia's foreign debt, was expressed by Dr. David Soskice at a recent meeting of the holders of Russian bonds here. Dr. Soskice is confidential secretary to former Premier Kerensky of Russia.

He declared that it would require an immense amount of capital to reconstruct the great industrial and agricultural fabric of Russia. Russia, he said, can only find that capital in England and America.

C. Birch Crisp, banker, said he believed the majority of the people of Russia would embrace the first opportunity to set themselves right with the rest of the civilized world.

Ineffectiveness of Sub Warfare Evident

Paris, July 29.—The growing ineffectiveness of the submarine warfare is indicated by official figures just published by the French government, relating to the French traffic in the Mediterranean.

According to these figures, not fewer than 2,060 vessels, chiefly merchantmen, with a total tonnage of 3,500,000, crossed the Mediterranean between February 24 and April 1, under escort. The average number of ships coming to or departing from France was 240.

The submarine attacks nevertheless had so diminished in force that only one in four resulted in damage to ships, and one out of every ten attacks were entirely fruitless. The result has been that the water traffic has steadily increased from January to February to March.

POPULATION OF HUNGARY GROWS STRAIGHTLY SMALLER

Amsterdam, July 29.—The military and political interests of the Central Powers in the war have been enormously damaged by the emigration of 1,000,000 Hungarian men to the United States from 1900 to 1914, says Emerich Ferenczi, a professor of the University of Budapest, in the Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung. The professor demanded that the emigration of Hungarian farm hands should be diverted from the United States to Germany.

If nothing is done to counteract the attraction of America, asserts the professor, Hungary, which has already lost about 3,000,000 men in war, will be further drained of masses of capable workers, women and children will be drafted from manual work, marriage and births decline, mortality and disease increase and military strength be impaired.

Booze Now Scarce Article In Alaska

Juneau, Alaska, July 10.—(By Mail).—More than six months have elapsed since prohibition nominally went into effect in Alaska, and during that time the cost of hard liquor has leaped from 50 cents to \$2 a bottle, according to Federal officers, who say the dry law has already proved a success in the territory. By the end of another six months, they believe, it will be next to impossible to obtain a bottle of whiskey in the territory, due to the

fine of \$1,000 provided for any steamer bringing intoxicants into the North. Whiskey caches proved numerous during the early days of Alaska prohibition. A coal shed yielded 1,200 bottles to raiding Federal officers, and other caches gave up liquor until the court houses here and at Ketchikan became crowded with it. Officers have been stimulated to their hunt for illicit whiskey sales by the conviction by jury of the man
