Airmen Do Daring Feats at Niagara

Niagara Falls, July 28.—The gorge below Niagara Falls seems to possess a peculiar fascination for aviators finishing their courses at the American and Canadian training fields within a radius of 30 miles of the cataract.

Many times recently tourists have been treated to unusual and unannounced performances. Lincoln Beachey's "Dip to Death" under the upper steel arch bridge, nearest the Falls, has been repeated many times. The most sensational performance

has been by two unidentified aviators supposed to be from the training field at Beamsville, Ont. They sent their two planes thru the gorge and under the lower steel arch and cantilever bridges which are close together, and in the narrowest part of the chasm.

The airmen came from the north entering the gorge near the Whirlpool and emerging at a point about 300 feet south of the cantilever bridge. They then circled over the Falls and sailed away toward Beamsville.
