ARGENTINA SUFFERS ON ACCOUNT OF THE WAR

Buenos Ayres, July 31.—Argentina, altho' not in the war, is suffering its material consequences, as evidenced by the constantly increasing cost of living, scarcity of work, lowering of wages, development of "trusts" cornering of articles of consumption, and extensive private speculation in public necessities.

The government is being urged to adopt emergency measures similar to those pursued by other countries where the war produced such conditions. It has been suggested that special committees be appointed by the state to intervene, or that additional powers be extended to those branches of the public administration, such as the police, hygiene, labor, which from the nature of their functions are best equipped for coping with the evils. Comparison of prices of various articles of prime necessity in force last year with those in force today indicate that many increases may not be attributed directly to the war but rather to artificial factors engendered by speculation, price-juggling and cornering of supplies.
