GERMAN PRIVATES GROW DISCOURAGED

London, July 31.—(British wireless service.)—Hope of winning the war is fading fast in the German trenches if letters from some German prisoners accurately reveal the morale of some of the German troops.

"The Americans are in front of us and they are terrible men," read one letter taken from a German prisoner. "We no longer have any hope," he continued. "My company of 100 is down to 80."

"We should stop before we are utterly demoralized," wrote another German soldier. "I am always hoping the French may succeed in roping us in. We should then at any rate be relieved of the moral anguish we are continually suffering. Our strength is becoming more and more sapped and if some of us do get home we shall be broken men."

U. S. Highly Praised By Italy and Belgium

Rome, July 31.—"The fifth year of war dawned full of hope for the Entente," Senator Guilelmo Marconi said to the Associated Press. "We have passed successfully thru many severe trials. Other trials may be ahead of us, but in the light of the dogged determination and undaunted courage shown by the Allied troops in the past we may look to the future with all confidence and trust."

"America and Italy have many points in common. Above all they feel that both fought and won their independence. Both have always stood for liberty, for the freedom of nationalities."

"We now have reached a crisis in the war. The Germans will know, if they do not obtain a decisive victory this year, that they will them-

selves infallibly be defeated when America has had time to put her full strength into the task. Therefore the Germans are throwing all their available men against the various points of our defensive line, hoping to break thru somewhere and bring about an immediate decision."

The position at present may be compared to the gigantic Battle of Waterloo, the armies of France and Italy, representing the English in the famous battle, holding out for all they are worth against the enemy's frenzied attacks in order to afford time for the Americans to enter the fight and make victory certain; thus changing our iron determination that the enemy shall not pass, into the certainty that we shall drive him before us into the heart of his own country."

Notice to Britons and Canadians in the United States

On July 31st the unratified convention between Great Britain and the United States will come into force and the period for voluntary enlistment terminates on September 28th.

During this period of sixty days, all British and Canadian between the ages of twenty and thirty-four, both inclusive, have an opportunity of entering their services to their own country at a time when the services of every man are urgently needed.

For sixty days all British subjects between the above ages will be exempt from the American draft and can enlist at any recruiting depot of the British-Canadian Recruiting Mission, regardless of the fact that they may have taken out first United States Citizenship papers or have been classified in Class 1. During this period of sixty days all Britons and Canadians of twenty years of age and those between the ages of thirty-one and thirty-four inclusive, will be required to register on a date fixed by Proclamation by the President and thirty days after registration, men of these ages will be liable to the American draft.

On September 28th, the period within which you can volunteer expires, and thereafter you will be liable to draft into the United States Army.

BERLIN HOLDS FACTS ABOUT BATTLE BACK

DEFEAT SUFFERED BY ENEMY DURING PAST FEW DAYS ARE HARD TO LOCATE

Berlin, via London, July 31.—"Apart from fighting on the Oureoc," says the evening report from general headquarters, "the day has been quiet."

Berlin, via London, July 30.—The official communication from general headquarters dealing with events of Saturday reports a quiet day on the crown prince's battle front. It makes mention, however, of "our new positions," while not admitting any material Allied advances.

The statement says "On the front of Crown Prince Rupprecht there was lively reconnoitering activity and a strong enemy thrust north of the Somme and north of Montdidier attacks were repulsed. The artillery was active in some sectors."

"On the German crown prince's battle front, the day passed quietly. There were small infantry engagements before our new positions."

"In Champagne the enemy made a local attack and penetrated our foremost line south of Fichtel mountain. He was for the greater part repulsed by our counter thrusts."
