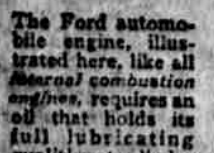

German Corn Crop Short This Year

New York, Aug. 1.—The yield of the German corn crop has been reduced and is barely sufficient for the feeding of the population, according to a statement made by Privy Councillor Kleimert of the Imperial German bureau, before the food committee of the reichstag, according to the Berlin Tageblatt of June 14.

In reply to a demand by the bourgeoisie parties that the farmers be allotted a larger quantity of a certain kind of corn (called in German Hintersaat, black corn), as this would have a conciliatory effect in view of

the many enforced deliveries and numerous compulsory measures, Kleimert said that the so-called "Hintersaat" could not be released for food purposes, for the reason that unfavorable experiences had been made in that respect in 1916. Notwithstanding a careful system of control extraordinary great difficulties would increase now that "the situation as a whole is more tense than in 1916 and that the total yield of our crops have been further reduced and barely suffice for the feeding of the population."

Colonists In Russia Growing Discontented

Amsterdam, Aug. 1.—"There is not a single German colonist in Russia who places the smallest faith in the Russian government. Our minds are made up. If Germany does not protect us with a strong hand there is only one way out, namely, to emigrate to the United States or Canada."

This is the statement of Pastor Johannes Schleuning, who has come to Berlin representing interests of so-called Wolga Germans, a farming colony of 700,000 persons established along that river.

After the Brest Litovsk peace, Schleuning returned from three years banishment in Siberia and made himself spokesman of two million German settlers spread over different regions in Russia.

According to his statement, the colonists were incorporated in the Russian army, first sent to the Russian-German front, and then some 300,000 were transferred to the Caucasus.

There they underwent terrible sufferings, thousands died, those staying at home had their properties confiscated, were reduced to beggary and the Bolsheviks completed their ruin.

Wolga colonists now ask to be assisted back to Germany or permitted to settle in the Baltic provinces. Failing this they intend to emigrate to America, declares Schleuning, who thus places before the German government a problem filled with peculiar difficulties.

Wholesale Acts of Hun Vandalism Evident

London, Aug. 1.—(British Wireless Service).—Evidence accumulated that during their brief stay in the Marne salient the Germans have been indulging in wholesale acts of vandalism. In a message sent from French headquarters, Reuter's correspondent gives details of their conduct while in possession of Chateau Thierry.

"The Germans have been in the town some time. When they found they would have to give it up they determined to take the only vengeance in their power. The injuries which have been inflicted on the town are such as could not be the result of shelling, the correspondent points out, as those houses which suffered most were entirely uninjured by shell, shrapnel or bullet.

"These houses," he says, "were magnificently furnished, the walls being hung with costly tapestries and admirable pictures.

"Today there is nothing that has not been destroyed. The tapestries have been hacked to pieces, the pictures slit from corner to corner, the leather and other chair coverings have been ripped and all the irreparable examples of craftsmanship of past centuries have been smashed.
