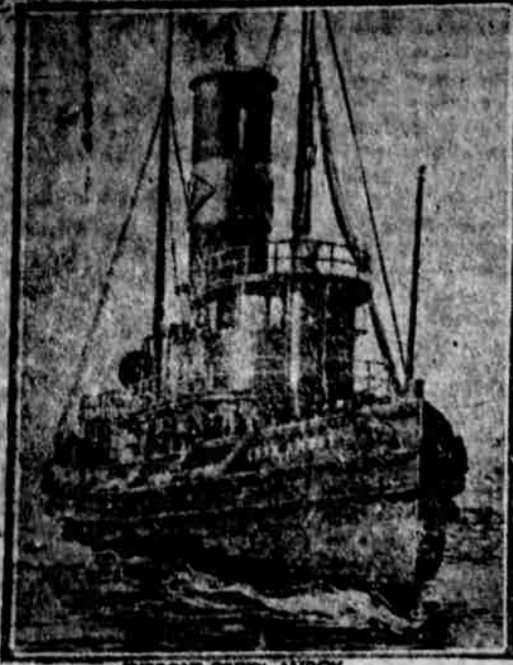


### Boy Waved Flag at U-Boat Firing on Tug
