While it has been known some weeks that the American gunners have handled the largest French guns used in this war, this is the first photograph to reach the United States, showing them at work. The gun is of 400 millimetre calibre, and it is the largest the French have built. The gun is camouflaged, and it is operated from a railway truck on tracks built up to the front line.

1916 Income Tax Over 173 Million

Interesting Facts Are Brought Out by the Returns of Those Who Are Getting the Big Salaries and Profits in the Nation's Business Life

Washington, August 5.—Of the \$173,000,000 personal income tax collected for the fiscal year 1916, investors and speculators in all fields shouldered just one-third of the burden, labor .086 per cent of it, and the remainder came from the multitudinous ranks of those whose incomes were classed as derived from "business" and "services."

Embraced within the latter classes is every calling from that of banker to the farmer with a scant acre, and in the professions, from the practitioner of international law to the modest cheropeidist.

Ninety per cent of the total tax was derived from those fulsome incomes of more than \$25,000, and 1.66 per cent from those of the \$5000 class, and less, altho the latter constituted more than a third of the total 137,000 returns.

The highest average rate of tax actually paid upon net income subject to tax was 12.9 per cent, which fell upon the highest income class of \$5,000,000 and over. Only ten individuals, however, bore the burden of that rate. They contributed \$13,000,000 to the total tax. The average rate of tax paid declined thru the

the \$3,000 to \$4,000 class amounting to about six per cent of their total income reported.

Altho for the country at large, the returns for single men were double those of single women, the six New England states were conspicuous exceptions to the rule. The total income reported by single men in that section exceeded by barely 15 per cent, the total of single women, bearing testimony either to the superior independence and earning capacity of the New England women or a reluctance to share inherited riches in matrimony. The District of Columbia and Hawaii were also conspicuous in that respect, showing about equal returns for single men and women.

A striking eccentricity in the report is the return in the skilled and unskilled labor class of twenty-two incomes above the \$50,000 mark, five of them being over \$100,000. Two hundred and eighty labor returns were above \$10,000.

Four commercial travelers showed incomes of over \$100,000, as did two saloon keepers, one professional sportsman, eighteen hotel proprietors and twenty-two insurance agents. Actors, singers and musicians to the number of 314 showed a total income of \$11,125,000, a net average of over \$35,000, and a possibility to stimulate the other \$170,000 not making returns. Five of these incomes were over \$150,000. In the classes of authors, editors and reporters there were 16 incomes of better than \$100,000, and two above \$500,000. Twelve ministers of the gospel showed incomes of more than \$50,000.

The legal profession earned the greatest total incomes among professions, altho the average income among engineers was higher.

Of the 23,000 manufacturers in the country in 1916, one in every ten made returns, paying a total of 12 per cent of the tax; of the merchants one in ten made returns, paying 12.5 per cent of the tax; of commission brokers in all fields, one in five, paying 8 per cent; real estate brokers, one in four, paying .83 per cent; and bankers, one in five, paying .41 per cent. About every four returns paying an average of 10 per cent of the tax, there are two hundred returns paying no tax at all.

BEARS PROVE TROUBLESOME TO YELLOWSTONE CAMPERS

Helena, August 5.—The fact that the hotels in Yellowstone National park are not open this season has caused an unusual number of bears to seek food from campers in the park, according to tourists here. The animals trot out of the timber into the road and decline to move out of the way of automobiles, it is declared, so that it is necessary to club or stone them into action.

The bears have no fear of a gun, and when once a tourist loads one of them he considers himself adopted and refuses to quit the party as long as it remains in the park.

BIG PERCENT OF CANADA UNEXPLORED

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 5.—Nearly 30 per cent of Canada is still unexplored, according to the beliefs of officials here. Most of the unknown country lies to the north in the country drained by the great Mackenzie river, which flows into the Arctic ocean.

Even the Indians, it is believed, have not yet penetrated the wild mountains bordering the Mackenzie basin. If the reports of the natives are to be believed the Mackenzie basin contains one of the largest of possible oil bearing countries on the face of the globe.

Natives say that up back of the basin of the Yukon river there are lakes 100 miles and over in length which no white men have yet seen.
