STATE CROP REPORT FOR WEEK BETTER

IMPROVEMENT IS NOTED OVER EARLIER INDICATIONS—NORTHERN COUNTIES HAVE COMMENCED THRESHING

PORTLAND, Aug. 9.—Winter wheat harvest is finished in Douglas county, where threshing has begun, and is well under way in other sections of the state, according to the weekly summary of the weather and crop conditions issued from the offices of the weather bureau August 7. In Umatilla county the crop is yielding better than was anticipated. Considerable spring wheat also is in shock, and threshing will begin during the coming week. Poor to fair yields only are indicated, some of the fields being too short to cut.

Reports of inferior yields of barley and oats were received from nearly all districts. While corn did fairly well, the ears are now forming, and it needs rain to make a satisfactory crop.

Alfalfa made satisfactory growth under irrigation, but on dry lands was much below the average. Fair to good second crops are being cut in Grant, Malheur and Umatilla counties.

Apples and pears are doing well in the principal fruit valleys. Prunes are ripening earlier than last fall and promise well in Douglas, Lane and Marion counties.

Petticoes and other late garden truck are greatly in need of moisture.
