DESERTERS GET POOR WELCOME ACROSS BORDER

JUAREZ, Mex., Aug. 10.—Deserters, draft evaders and pro-Germans who seek refuge in Mexico find little welcome or comfort there. These aliens sit around the old passenger depot, waiting for a chance to steal a ride south, walk up and down the main street begging money for meals from any of their own nationality, or work at most menial jobs obtainable in the stores and homes of the foreign residents.

Recently three draft evaders appeared on the streets here were true types of the many who have come to Mexico since the United States entered the war. One was a German boy of 20 who had fled from Germany to escape army service, had lived with an uncle in Chicago and finally crossed the border to prevent being interned. A second was an Italian shoe factory worker from Boston, who had failed to register and had fled. A third was an American of the tramp type who was demented from lack of food and worry. All were dirty, unshaven and destitute, and all expressed a desire to return to the United States and surrender.

CLEVER TRICKS ARE WORKED ON U-BOAT CREWS

LONDON, Aug. 10.—Revelation regarding the work of British mystery ships which have played an important part in anti-submarine warfare are made by the naval correspondent of the Times.

Until this week the public has known nothing about the mystery ships, known in the navy as the "Q" ships, altho several officers, notably Captain Gordon Campbell, have been decorated for services on these vessels. Details now can be made public as the Germans are becoming aware of the methods thru bitter experience.

How a "woman and baby" accounted for a U-boat is told by the correspondent. The submarine ordered a vessel to surrender and fired a few shells into her. The boats then left the ship, leaving on board a woman who ran up and down the deck with a baby in her arms as if mad. The U-boat came alongside the vessel and the woman hurled the "baby" into the open hatch. The "baby" exploded and blew out the bottom of the submarine. The "woman" was decorated with the Victoria cross.

"In addition to the woman and baby" case, the correspondent mentions the story of a retired admiral, serving as a captain, who placed a haystack on board an ancient looking craft. When the U-boat ordered her to surrender, the Germans were astonished to receive a broadside from the haystack.

On one occasion a seavorn tramp steamer was crossing the North sea when a submarine ordered the crew to abandon ship. So sure was the German of his prey that the bombs with which he intended to sink the vessel were brought on deck around the conning tower. It required only a shell or two from the tramp's concealed armament to explode the bombs and blow the U-boat out of the water.

Captain Gordon O. Campbell, then a commander, was decorated with the Victoria Cross and the D. S. O. in 1916, being the first to receive these orders without the nature of his heroic act being made public. It was announced early in 1917 that the reason for his decorations would be made public after the war.

Captain Campbell gained the military cross for bravery in handling a tank when that weapon was first used by the British in the summer of 1916.

BRITISH HAVE GREAT SCHEMES TO KILL HUNS

LONDON, July 30.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—If the dreams of numerous British amateur inventors who have been besieging the ministry of munitions could be realized, the war would have been over long since and little would be left of the German army. Recent proposals include the following:

Freeze the clouds and mount artillery thereon.

Train cormorants to fly to Essen to pick the mortar from Krupp's walls so that they will crumble.

Trail from balloons monster magnets that would snatch rifles from the hands of the German soldiers.

Perch men on shells to steer them. A suggestion often submitted is to attach a searchlight to an anti-aircraft gun, project the light on a Gotha and shoot along the beam. Unfortunately, shells will not follow a path of light.

Other schemes for dealing with hostile aircraft are to suspend heavy guns from captive balloons; to arm defense airplanes with scythes; to provide heat rays for setting Zeppelins on fire, and to cover the moon with a big black balloon. To prevent polished rails from shining at night and acting as a guide to enemy aircraft, the last coach of the last train is to drop blacking on them.

A shell containing gravel is to lay a pathway over mud, and another, containing an irritant powder or a sticky substance, is to hamper machine guns.

The "relay shell" is a favorite proposal, the plan being for a shell at the height of its flight to expel a smaller inner shell. As a shell does not point directly along its trajectory,

ory, it would be impossible to secure accuracy of aim for the second shell.

Among the more miscellaneous projects are:

To petrify German soldiers by squirting cement over them.

To throw snakes by pneumatic propulsion into the enemy trenches.

To penetrate and attack Germany itself via a "tube" built "all the way" from England.

It is said that about one suggestion in ten that reach the ministry of munitions is novel and possible.

The air ministry announces that its air invention committee, formed about nine months ago, has examined more than 5,000 inventions and suggestions.
