HEAVY DRAFT REGISTRATION IN SEPTEMBER

MEN WITHIN AGE LIMITS ARE CAUTIONED TO BE PREPARED TO ENROLL ON DATE STATED IN PROCLAMATION

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—Some time early in September every man in Oregon between the ages of 18 and 20, and 32 and 45 years, inclusive, will be required to register under the new draft law, now before congress.

These age limits are not yet tentative, as the bill has not been finally acted upon. Minor changes may be made in the age limits. But they will be in general as stated in the foregoing.

The exact date of the opening registration day has not yet been set, and cannot be set until congress passes the law to lower and extend the draft ages. But it is considered certain that the law will be passed very soon and that the registration day, be proclaimed by the President will be early in September.

Every man who comes within the designated ages should keep himself very carefully informed, for his own protection, about the status of the new draft measure, and especially as to the day fixed for registration. Failure to register on the proper day will subject the neglectful person to a heavy penalty. Ignorance will not excuse him.

Oregon is now pretty well versed in the procedure to be complied with by men of draft age on registration day, for already two such draft registration days have been held in the state.

The first was that of June 5, 1917, when all men from 21 to 30 years of age, inclusive, were required to register for military service. The second registration day was that of June 5 of this year, when all men who had attained their 21st birthday since registration day of the preceding year were required to register.

The coming registration day will be even more important than these two, for the number of men to be registered is estimated at fully one-third greater than on June 5, 1917. It is believed that in Oregon alone fully 100,000 men will have to register.

So far as possible, registration places on the coming registration day will be in regular voting places. Local boards will be in full charge of the registration.

Local boards already have received instructions to make all preliminary arrangements at once for conducting the registration, so there will be no delay when the President's proclamation is issued. Registrants are to be appointed for each precinct on the ratio of about one to each probable eighty registrants.

Interpreters will also be provided where necessary to facilitate registration.

LIBERTY BOND PAYMENTS DUE

The final payment of 40 per cent on the Third Liberty Bond subscriptions will be due at the banks on August 15. This payment includes interest on the deferred payments at 4 per cent from May 9, the date of the bonds. Subscribers who complete their payments will receive from the government interest on the full amount of the bonds from May 9 at 4 per cent; hence, the interest to be paid by the subscribers when completing payment of their subscriptions will be returned to them at the time that they cash their first interest coupons, which are payable September 15 next.

The interest to be paid August 15 is 39 cents on a \$50.00 bond and 78 cents on a \$100.00 bond, etc.

Heretofore the banks have notified the subscribers of the approaching payments, but this will not be done at this time owing to the fact that the government has withdrawn the privilege of sending such notifications thru the mail as official government business.

The bonds will not be available for delivery to the subscribers when making final payment, as the government does not send the bonds to the banks until paid for at headquarters at the Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco. It will probably be two weeks or more after August 15 before the bonds are ready for distribution to those making final payment on August 15.

Subscribers are urged to make payment promptly so that the business pertaining to the Third Loan may be closed up in anticipation of the coming Fourth Loan.

CHINESE SHOW SYMPATHY WITH UNITED STATES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Chinese sympathy and friendship for the United States was shown in striking fashion during the last Red Cross drive for funds to carry on the organization's relief work in Europe. An account of the appeal made in China for aid for the Red Cross was received today from Julian Arnold, commercial attaché at Shanghai, saying the Chinese of all classes "responded nobly."

America was the first nation to solicit the active participation of the Chinese in war relief work.

"We secured a good, strong committee of young Chinese headed by C. T. Wong, former vice-president of the Chinese senate," Mr. Arnold said. "Eight teams were organized under team captains, who were American college graduates. These Chinese teams worked hard and 25,000 Chinese were added to the Red Cross membership from Shanghai and environs."

CONTRABAND TRADE BETWEEN GERMANY AND ICELAND

LONDON, Aug. 12.—A great deal of trade was done between Iceland and Germany and Austria, earlier in the war, the opinion of the attorney general, expressed during the hearing of a case in the Prize court. This contraband trade was upon an enormous scale and very difficult to detect, he declared. He gave an illustration, between October and December, 1914, the entire output of 200,000 woolskins was exported to Germany and Austria via Denmark.

Altho the British government knew this was going on it had not been possible to detect it owing to the territorial nature of the voyage till they had been able to get evidence by means of intercepted messages. Fortunes had been made in Iceland. Voyages were usually secret and by unusual courses designed to avoid the British navy, while documents were made out to conceal the true nature of the transaction.
