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EFFICIENCY OF AMERICANS IS MUCH PRAISED

PARIS, Aug. 16.—It would have been impossible to proceed more skillfully in giving American forces a maximum of efficiency in a minimum of time, says Colonel de Thomason, the military writer, in referring to the announcement of the formation of the First American field army.

"This work would not have been possible had it not been for the good will, devotion and intelligence of the Americans," he explained. "We know now that the German high command has been most uneasy about the American army since June. Divisional leaders have received orders to do as much damage as possible to American troops because the units fighting were destined to be nucleus of new formations."

CONFIDENCE IS EXPRESSED BY LLOYD GEORGE

LONDON, Aug. 1 — (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—"There is a new land confronting us," said Lloyd George in a recent speech. "What manner of country it will be, he continued, "will depend on how the war goes and how things go after the war."

"I am more confident today than I have ever been, and for reasons it would not be relevant for me to enter on at the moment; but one of the latest reasons is the impression made on me by the American troops I saw in France. They are superb in material and in training, and in the way they have borne themselves in the trying conditions of battles they have fought. I found a great spirit of confidence which strengthens our conviction of victory."

Suggestions:

Stir your tea, coffee or cocoa well. Don't leave sugar in the bottom of the cup.

Sweeten breakfast cereals with honey, syrup, maple sugar, raisins, or dates.

Substitute molasses, maple syrup, or syrups made from sorghum and corn, for part of sugar used in cooking.

Substitute syrups or honey for part of the sugar in cake. One cup of syrup or honey will take the place of one cup of sugar and one-fourth of a cup of liquid. In almost any cake recipe the syrup or honey may be used for one-half of the sugar.

Make your cakes without frosting.

Use fresh, dried or preserved fruit for dessert in the place of "made dishes" that require sugar. Bake apples or pears with a little water for several hours, until a rich syrup forms. If more sweetening is desired add honey or molasses. Cook dried prunes without sugar in the water in which they were soaked until the liquid is almost boiled away. If more juice is wanted add water to the syrup. The long, slow cooking develops a rich flavor and the addition of sugar is unnecessary.

other disturbance. There will be a great social and economic disturbance.

"There are two alternatives. One is that the war will have sobered the millions who have passed thru the fire, whether in France or in the anxieties at home. Their vision will have been broadened, their sympathy deepened, their outlook and purpose made clearer, firmer and more exalted. There are millions who have been in daily contact with death, walking hourly over its trap doors. They have come into contact with very terrible realities. That is one view.

"The other is that there are millions who for these years have endured privations, discomfort, wretchedness, as well as pain and terror, and who have made up their minds to have a good time for the rest of their lives when it is over. That is a very dangerous frame of mind for a nation to be in."
