"YOURS FOR VICTORY THROUGH SACRIFICE AND FAITH"

MORALS OF GERMANY ON A DECLINE

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 1.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press) The moral deterioration of the German nation in consequence of war-time trials is greatly troubling clear-minded observers of the Fatherland. The Lutheran Synod of Berlin the other day called a special meeting to discuss how to deal with the dissolute ways of the thousands of young munition workers, male and female, who habitually squander their high wages in riotous living and immorality. It was agreed that most of the youth of the country seemed to be entirely beyond control. Much has already been written about the unsafety of the public streets, and the general callous indifference to the sufferings of others. This seems to apply to the whole of Germany.

"Every man's hand seems to be against his neighbor," the Cologne Gazette despairingly exclaims, and it devotes a whole article to the intense latent anger of the populace at the extortions to which it is subjected by the unscrupulous method of tradesmen, who in their turn are made the victims of deficient government control and the unscrupulous practices of producers.

Popular discontent is fanned by announcements of extravagant profits such as those made by a meat firm which supplies the army. It operated with a capital of a million marks and in one year netted a profit of 722,638 marks.

a restaurant calls for "three times a portion of whatever is most expensive" is a standing type. Another feature is the phenomenal demand for real estate by war profiteers, whose aim is to become "lord of a manor." The German Tage-Zeitung the other day contained no fewer than twenty-five advertisements for country estates wanted at once, from 1,000 to 2,500 acres, price no object, although land has risen to double, and some times treble, the value of pre-war times.

All these things serve to embitter the helpless classes to a degree of danger of which has not escaped the attention of the powers that be, as witness recent arrangements made at Munster, Westphalia, where the service of the clergy has been enlisted by the officials war food department to keep down the growing popular discontent over the food difficulties.

Even the Rhenish Westphalian Gazette, which gives publicity to this interesting piece of news, expresses the fear that the last few months preceding the harvest will be an exceedingly trying time, and for this reason the war food department wishes to remain in constant touch with the minor clergy, so as to have the benefit of their observations among the people.

With reference to this, the socialist Vorwaerts prophetically exclaims: "After the war there will be only two camps—war profiteers and out-and-out socialists."

HIGHEST ORCHARD NOW BEARING FRUIT

BUTTE, MONT., Aug. 16.—What is believed to be one of the highest apple orchards in the world has borne fruit this year. It is that of J. R. Wharton, manager of the local street railway company, and is located at a pleasure resort near here on the Great Divide, 8,000 feet above sea level. The orchard has been planted for some years, but has never before borne.

KNITTING BY WOMEN

TEMPORARILY CHECKED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.—Hand knitting for the soldiers and sailors is to be checked until the war industries board can survey stocks and ascertain whether there is enough woolen and worsted in the country for winter uniforms and overcoats.

The board has directed spinners to discontinue manufacturing woolen and worsted yarns for hand knitting and the shipment of yarns or wool until further notice.

HAYWOOD DEFENDING SABOTAGE

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, ILL., Aug. 16.—Sabotage was defined as the "biggest, strongest and most wholesome weapon of the working class" by William D. Haywood, general secretary and treasurer of the Industrial Workers of the World, at the trial of 100 leaders of the organization charged with violations of the espionage law. "We believe in using sabotage to protect humanity," said Haywood. "It prevents dishonest employers from adulterating food products and other necessities of life. Sabotage must be used if the capitalistic class is to be put out of business. "It is the only practical means of protecting humanity from being robbed and poisoned." The witness referred to a recent strike of hotel employees in New York, where it was alleged the strikers used "mickie flinn" powders and stink bombs, and said he disapproved of such methods. He said at the time he made the speech to the strikers in which he advised them to punish their bosses by serving double portions of food to the patrons.
