TEN THOUSAND ELKS TO MEET AT CONVENTION

PORTLAND, Aug. 10.—Ten thousand delegates and their families are expected to attend the first annual state convention of the B. P. O. E. in Portland on August 26 and 27 and 28, according to an estimate given yesterday by Charles Ringler, exalted ruler of Portland lodge No. 142.

"This is the first time Portland has had a state convention," said Mr. Ringler, "and we intend to make a big thing of it." The tentative program arranged for the convention has been announced. On Monday, August 26, the opening date, delegates will be registered during the morning and taken for a trip along the Columbia River highway in the afternoon. In the evening there will be a big get-together meeting at the municipal Auditorium. Mr. Ringler, as head of the Portland lodge, will deliver an address of welcome to the visitors. Mayor Baker will also offer the hospitality of the city. Dr. Kennedy, president of the state association, will speak on the first convention. Louis J. Simpson, of North Bend, will speak for the visitors.

The program also includes an organ recital by Ralph W. Hoyt, vocal solos by Warren Irwin and others, a patriotic tableau, "The Spirit of '76," the Allied Review and the Elks band.

Tuesday morning the convention will go into session at the Portland club rooms. In the afternoon a trip will be made to the Vancouver Barracks, where the Vancouver lodge will act as host. The entire regiment stationed at the barracks will turn out for review. In the evening a parade will be staged.

Lodges throughout the Pacific Coast states will be represented by delegates and bands, and each will carry its service flag. Portland shipyard bands will also be in line. Among the cities represented will be Vancouver, Centralia, Tacoma, Seattle, Oregon City, Salem, McMinnville, Pendleton, and Klamath Falls. The Klamath delegation will bring a band, as they are going to make a hard fight to secure the 1919 convention.

Wednesday the convention will hold its closing session in the morning. The afternoon will be without schedule to give the visitors a chance to "do the town" as they choose. In the evening the convention will come to a close with a huge celebration at the Oaks.
