SPECIAL TAXES ON OCCUPATION ARE PROBABLE

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 17.—Special taxes of \$10 a year on occupation or profession, except war industry trades, farmers, teachers and ministers of the gospel, have been written into the \$2,000,000,000 war revenue bill by the house ways and means committee. A similar tax was placed upon any business with receipts of \$3000 a year or more, with a levy of \$25 a year on wholesale houses with receipts of \$200,000 or more.

Newspapers, press associations and periodicals were exempted from the proposed 10 per cent tax on the amount paid for leased telegraph and telephone wires in the pending \$2,000,000,000 revenue bill, after a vigorous fight by Representative Hays of Illinois, and Longworth of Ohio. It was amended so as to apply only to stock brokers' lines.

In addition to the ordinary tax of 10 per cent on all jewelry sold at wholesale, the committee put a 10 per cent tax on retail sales of jewelry compounded wholly or partly of platinum. This is designed to discourage such use of platinum during the war.

GERMANS ARE DECLARED TO WANT PEACE

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Aug. 17.—

George Ehret, American brewer, has arrived here on board a Norwegian liner. Ehret has been spending a great deal of his time during the past 50 years in Germany. His home is in St. Louis.

He declared his intention of filing a claim for the return of his property in this country which was recently taken over by the Allied property custodian, A. Mitchell Palmer.

"There is a universal feeling for peace in Germany," said Ehret. "Socialists are getting the upper hand thru this desire of the people. Food conditions are almost unbearable. There are substitutes for everything. Only the poor who work in munitions factories can afford to buy real food, because of the high salaries they receive. Conditions among the empire's population are at the lowest conceivable ebb."

"The majority of the people want only peace."

Ehret is 83 years old.

GOVERNMENT OF OREGON MAY BE CONSOLIDATED

SALEM, Aug. 17.—The state consolidation commission met here in

executive session Tuesday to consider the report prepared by J. M. Matthews, government specialist of Illinois, covering all departments of the state government and suggesting means to consolidate boards and commissions. The commission went into executive session on the advice of Mr. Matthews. Herman von Borstel made the motion for the closed meeting and no one voted against it.

Mr. Matthews and his assistant, Fred Topken, have been making a survey of the state departments for several weeks, and a report on each department, when completed, was sent to the members of the commission. These merged into one document compose the report to the consolidation commission. It is understood that the entire report will be gone over before the deliberations of the commission are made public. All members of the commission are present.

The commission is inclined to consider favorably a plan to remove the governor from membership on all boards except those of which he is a member by constitutional provision. The executive department was one of those considered today. A nine-department scheme was originally planned by the commission. Apparently it will be adhered to in the main with all department heads made appointive by the governor except those whose election is provided by the constitution.

One change that will be made will be the separation of the interests of labor and capital in state government by separating labor from commerce and industry. Labor was merged with the two latter in the original scheme of the commission. The commission expects to abolish the state fair board and merge that department with the agricultural department, but to retain the state fair

secretary. Another recommendation will be the merging of the insurance, banking and corporation department under one head.

ATTEMPT TO HIDE FACTS CRITICISED

THE HAGUE, Aug. 17.—German

newspapers are asking pointed questions concerning reverses in the west. A Berlin dispatch to the Post from Munich complains of the attempts of certain German official circles to conceal the truth from the people. It says this has done incalculable harm and is largely responsible for the present bitterness. The dispatch adds:

"The same day that General Ludendorff confessed our strategic plans had failed, Prince Henry of Prussia in a speech at Hamburg said the Turkish attaché had just told him he considered the battle on the Marne a German victory. So the German public may choose between Ludendorff and the Turkish attaché."

"It is ridiculous to suppose that the importance of the events can be concealed ultimately from the people."

The Deutsches Zeitung of Berlin declares:

"The events between the Somme and the Avre constitute the first serious defeat of the war."

The newspaper attributes the defeat to the weak morale of the troops of Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria, due to the last reichstag speech of Former Foreign Secretary Von Kuehlmann.

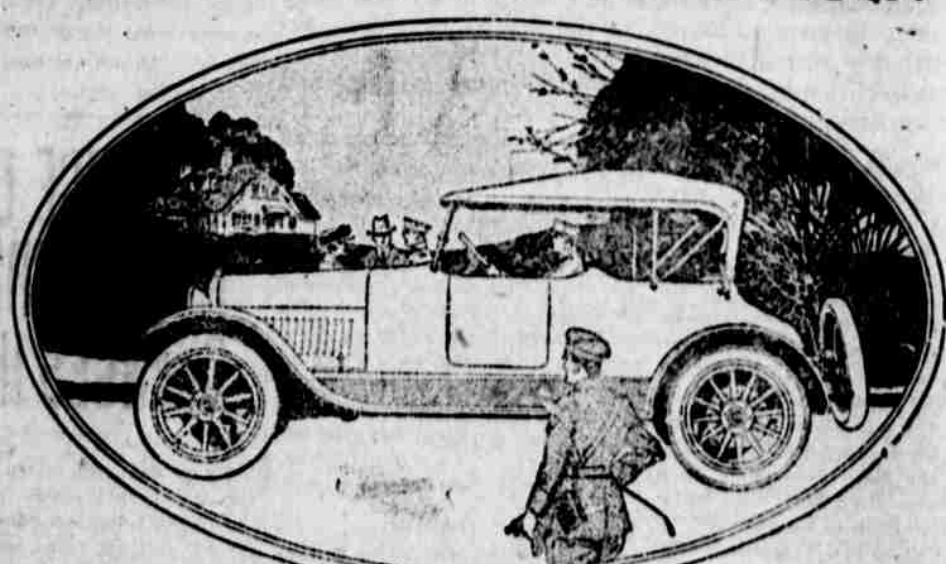
