

WONDERFUL AIR MAIL RECORD DURING JULY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 17.—

The July record of the air mail service, as shown in the monthly report of Second Assistant Postmaster General Praeger, surpasses that of June. During July, out of 108 possible flights, 98 perfect flights were made without interruption thru forced landings or mechanical troubles. Only two of the 108 legs were defaulted on account of weather and only 8 forced landings were made. Four of the forced landings were by an officer new in the work and the route.  Lieut. J. C. Edgerton, 18 perfect trips with a total of 2,430 miles, without a single interrupted flight.
 Lieut. Walter Miller, 19 perfect trips with an aggregate of 1,710 miles without a single interruption.

Lieut. H. P. Culver, 14 perfect flights, aggregating 1,350 miles, and 1 interrupted flight.
 Lieut. T. H. Webb, 12 perfect flights, aggregating 1,080 miles, and 1 interrupted flight.
 During the month all mail speed records were broken when on July 29 the mail was carried from Washington to New York in two hours and five minutes, flying time, a distance of 250 miles.

Storm-flying records were established when Lieuts. Edgerton, Bon-sal, and Kilgore put their machines thru driving rain and wind storms that practically shut out visibility, flying entirely by compass, and making perfect landings. On the New York-Philadelphia end several flights were made by Lieuts. Miller, Culver and Webb thru fog, haze and rain.

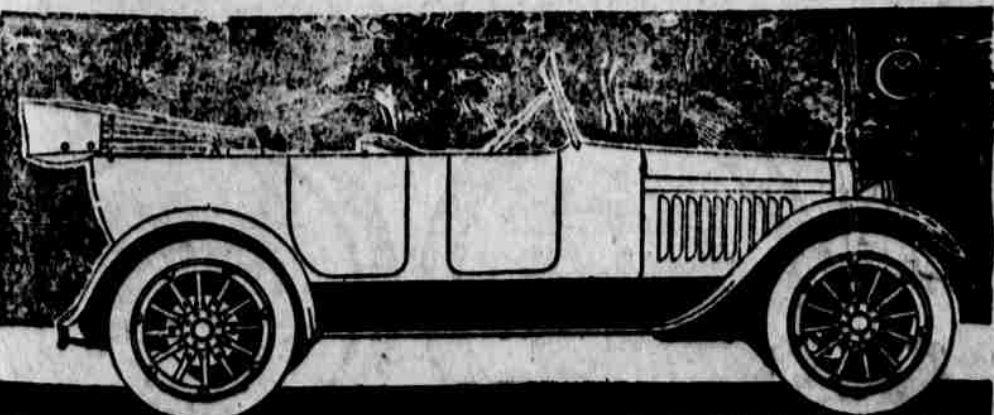
