DANGER OF PRIVATION NOW OVER

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Universal war bread of better quality than last year for all the nations fighting Germany, practically without rationing, will be one of the results of the food controllers' conference at London.

Herbert C. Hoover, American food administrator, announced to the Associated Press. He said there will be ample supplies of fats and meat if the populations are economical and avoid waste.

"The danger of privation is now passed," he said. Mr. Hoover explained that the people of North America were now able to take over the bulk of food supplies required and it will therefore be possible to curtail the total length of the voyage necessary to bring these supplies to the European Allies, thus affecting a considerable saving in tonnage.

He said a program had been agreed upon regarding different commodities required to maintain health and comfort. He appealed to the United States for continued economy to meet the increased demands of Europe and carry over a stock of foodstuffs that will form positive assurance against climatic eventualities.

The island of Oahu of which Honolulu is the county seat has been "dry" since April under and executive order issued by the president.

The islands affected by the Sheppard law are Hawaii, Maui and Kauai.

Under the Sheppard act the importation of liquor is forbidden. Possession of liquor in the home, however, is permissible.

The law also operates to put an end to the brewing of sake, the Japanese national drink. The Japanese at first were inclined to protect the enactment of the ground that sake is essential to their diet. Japanese officials, however, prevailed on their countrymen to comply with the law in view of it being a war measure.

PROHIBITION HAS BEGUN IN HAWAII

HONOLULU, T. H. Aug. 20.—The territory of Hawaii tonight was added to the list of war-time prohibition communities. At midnight the four main islands of the group went "dry" by Congressional enactment, the Sheppard law barring the manufacture and sale of liquor in the island for two years after peace, becoming operative. At that time the territory may call a plebiscite on whether prohibition shall continue.
