This photo of the harbor of Zeebrugge, Belgium, was taken several weeks ago, long after the British had
sunk cruisers filled with cement to block the channel and prevent U-boats from escaping from it. The pic-
ture was obtained from Holland and the original had come from Germany. It shows very little space for
U-boats to leave their base, from which they had preyed on Allied commerce.

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
