GREATEST WAR FILM GREETED BY HUNDREDS

PATRIOTIC AUDIENCES ASSEMBLE TO SEE THRILLING PICTURE STORY BY AMERICA'S RENOWNED AMBASSADOR

The picturization of Ambassador Gerard's famous book, "My Four Years in Germany," met a reception in Klamath Falls such as has never been accorded a screen production of any kind with the one exception of the Klamath county pictures shown in 1915.

Packed houses sat breathless through reels of film, as the machinations of the German political leaders were faithfully unfolded thru years preceding the entrance of the United States into the world war.

While many of these diabolical schemes and deeds have been more or less common knowledge with the general reading public, it is only when the events are unfolded in their logical sequence that the fiendish designs and plots are fully comprehended.

The tremendous responsibilities placed upon a foreign diplomat at a time when relations are strained was brought out in a most emphatic manner. How the destiny of a hundred million people hung for months on one human being, whose clever moves of statesmanship showed remarkable

strategy and whose marvelous courage was shown in a way that made every one in the house proud of his kinship. Censored by the celebrated diplomat himself, all the incidents portrayed were worked out from actual occurrences.

This film is superior to any of the war films shown in Klamath Falls thus far, altho there have been a number that were excellent.

STOCK RANGES NOW USED TO FULL CAPACITY

DENVER, Aug. 26.—J. T. Jardine, national inspector of grazing for the Federal forest service, who is making his annual tour of inspection of grazing conditions throughout the country, will make an investigation of the larkspur conditions in the Butte National forest while in the Rocky mountain region. Larkspur is a poisonous plant which is deadly to cattle but does not affect sheep. The campaign to eradicate the plant from the ranges was begun by the government in 1915.

While in Denver recently Mr. Jardine said that 500,000 emergency sheep and 150,000 emergency cattle had been taken care of on the ranges of the national forests of the country this year. The problem of successfully handling the situation, he says, is one of management and the prevention of losses.

"The demand for ranges the last few years," said Mr. Jardine, "has been greater than the supply, and we are utilizing every possible means to improve range conditions. A great deal has been done this year in the building of additional fences, in providing better sodding in water development projects and in the building of bridges over which cattle can cross."

WAR GARDENS WORTH QUARTER BILLION DOLLARS

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 26.—Three million four thousand war gardens in 14 scattered over the United States will add more than \$250,000,000 to the food wealth of the country this year, according to a report made for the encouragement of western states by Russell T. Edwards, director of the educational section of the national war garden commission.

The drive to convert "slack land" into war gardens is meeting with success, Mr. Edwards reported. He forwarded the following estimates for 1918:
