WOMEN ARE CANDIDATES IN MONTANA

HELENA, MONT., Aug. 27.—Two
women are seeking nominations for
places in the national legislative body
of the United States at the primary
election held in Montana today.
Miss Jeannette Rankin, elected as a
representative to congress two years
ago and the first woman to hold a
seat in the House, is a candidate for
the republican nomination for United
States Senator, and Mrs. H. C. Mac-
donald on the ballot, for the demo-
cratic nomination for congress in the
first district.

In addition to the selection of
candidates for these offices, nomina-
tions are to be made today for a jus-
tice of the supreme court, state audi-
tor, railroad commissioner, members
of the state legislature, judges of the
district court and all county offices.
Miss Rankin is opposed on the re-
publican ticket by Dr. O. M. Lan-
trum of Helena. Judge Edmund
Nichols of Billings, and Harry H.
Parsons of Missoula. After the fil-
ings closed August 7, Parsons and
Judge E. Nichols filed with the se-
cretary of state notices of their with-
drawal from the contest but, upon
the attorney general's ruling that
their names must stay on the ballot,
they announced their intention to
continue their campaigns.

The winner in the republican con-
test will be opposed at the general
election by T. J. Walsh, incumbent,
who has no opposition for the demo-
cratic nomination for United States
senator.

Mrs. Macdonald is contesting with
Congressman John M. Evans for the
democratic nomination in the first
congressional district, where Thomas
Kane and F. B. Linderman are the
republican aspirants for congress.

In the second congressional district
R. G. Linebarger, R. J. Moore and
C. W. Riddick are seeking the re-
publican nomination and Harry B.
M. Mitchell of Great Falls is the sole
democrat in the race.

CAPTIVES NOW APPEAR MOST DISCOURAGED

BRITISH ARMY HEADQUARTERS,
Aug. 27.—The demeanor of
hundreds of German officers taken
prisoner recently is in striking con-
trast with the attitude of officers
captured during the British retreat
last spring. The German officer pri-
soners were arrogant and meant to
crush the British to earth, but now
they are depressed and very anxious.
They appear very willing to talk and
the tenor of their conversation may
be summed up as follows:

They say Germany entered the war
with enthusiasm, but this has long
since disappeared and the struggle
has now become an economic one
with Great Britain.
They admit that Germany is in prac-
tically a hopeless condition, both ec-
onomically and from the man power
point of view and ask whether Great
Britain cannot now consider Ger-
many sufficiently reduced to be no
longer a dangerous trade rival, or
whether the Allies intend to crush
her altogether. In the latter case,
they say, Germany will be forced to
fight to the last, but they make no
effort to conceal their impression of
what this means for the Fatherland.
They say they believe there is every
disposition to evacuate Belgium and
northern France and even negotiate
the Alsace-Lorraine question.

They are generally unanimous in
agreeing that annexations thus far
made and the Brest-Litovsk peace
treaty were a great mistake, but
think they cannot withdraw from
Russia in the present condition of af-
fairs there.

They are aware that the American
army now has assumed very formid-
able proportions, and there is a gen-
eral admission of the seriousness of
this factor.

The submarine campaign they can-
not refer to without gestures of im-
patience.

Captured non-commissioned offi-
cers attribute recent German defeats
to the inefficiency of their air service
and more especially to the inexperi-
ence and lack of stamina of the lat-
est recruits, who are mostly inade-
quately drilled and trained, and who
are physically incapable of sustain-
ing the heavy strain of defensive war-
fare. The mere presence of these
new recruits, they say, produces in a
company a demoralizing effect upon
the older men, because it indicates
to what straits Germany must be re-
duced to employ such poor material.

SOLDIERS IN FRANCE

NEED MORE BOOKS

The Klamath Falls Public Library
has received today a request from the
American Library Association's Head-
quarters in Washington for more
books from this community for the
men overseas.

The appeal from Washington
states that new novels and good
Western stories, whether new or old,
are most needed. Books by Kane
Gray, Rex Beach, Jack London,
Ralph Connor, Owen Winter and O.
Henry are very popular. The Public
Library announces that it will re-
ceive and forward all suitable books
that are turned in. It urges the
friends of the soldiers and sailors,
many of whom have already respon-
ded most generously, to give more
books.

The communication received by
the Library from the Washington
Headquarters states that over 600-
000 books have been sent overseas.
The supply is nearly exhausted, and
several hundred thousand more will
be needed soon by the six dispatch
offices which are now shipping books
to France. The books are packed at
these dispatch offices in strong cases,
so built that they serve as a book-
case.

They go on the decks of transports
in cargo vessels and in naval vessels.
Those that go on the decks of trans-
ports are open so that the men may
have reading matter for use on the
voyage. All these books are gather-
ed together again, however, replaced
in the cases and delivered to the
proper officials in France.

In France, the books are distrib-
uted by an experienced Librarian,
representing the American Library
Association. Most of them go to Y.
M. C. A. Red Cross and Salvation
Army huts, hospitals and canteens.
Others go directly to chaplains and
officers.

Suggestions:

Stir your tea, coffee or cocoa well.
Don't leave sugar in the bottom of
the cup.

Sweeten breakfast cereals with
honey, syrup, maple sugar, raisins,
or dates.

Substitute molasses, maple syrup,
or syrup made from sorghum and
corn, for part of sugar used in cook-
ing.

Substitute syrups or honey for part
of the sugar in cake. One cup of
syrup or honey will take the place of
one cup of sugar and one-fourth of a
cup of liquid. In almost any cake
recipe the syrup or honey may be
used for one-half of the sugar.

Make your cakes without frosting.

Use fresh, dried or preserved fruit
for dessert in the place of "made
dishes" that require sugar. Bake ap-
ples or pears with a little water for
several hours, until a rich syrup
forms. If more sweetening is desired
add honey or molasses. Cook dried
prunes without sugar in the water in
which they were soaked until the li-
quid is almost boiled away. If more
juice is wanted add water to the sy-
rup. The long, slow cooking devel-
ops a rich flavor and the addition of
sugar is unnecessary.
