YANKEE ARMY MOST MORAL IN THE WAR

PARIS, July 30.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The more than a million men of the American Expeditionary Forces constitutes the most moral army in the world, according to official statements of the United States Medical Corps.

Attributing the extremely low percentage of affected men in the army to the medical programs of the United States forces, medical officers say that the two important factors in the production of the most moral army were vigorous work programs coupled with the diversified recreations of the camp and hygienic measures.

At a meeting of the Research society of the American Red Cross consisting of the medical officers of the United States army, the plan now in operation in the training camps of the United States, where illicit houses and the liquor traffic is suppressed was spoken of as highly productive of results.

The introduction in the training camps of the United States of athletic games, libraries, recreation halls under the Y. M. C. A. and other organizations, lectures, and wholesome step in the solution of the problem of amusements was hailed as a great vice in the army. The work of the chaplains, the universities and the press also was mentioned as playing a great part in the alleviation.

The education of men along moral lines conducted by the medical officers, thru literature which was distributed among the men by exhibits and thru the agencies of the war department commission of training camp activities served to keep the men in the right mental attitude toward the problem, the medical officers stated.

PLEDGES FOR THRESHERMEN

WASHINGTON, D. C. Aug. 27.—The Food Administration, Farm Journals Section, Educational Division, issues the following "rules and regulations" as prepared by the Grain-Threshing Division. Threshermen who agree to observe these rules are granted a certificate of membership in the Food Administration:

In accepting membership in the United States Food Administration, it is expected that threshermen will do their best to observe the following:

1. I will do my best to properly repair my machine so that it can be adjusted to save grain.

2. I will encourage the threshing of grain only when it is dry and ripe, unless a greater loss will be incurred by waiting and only then with the approval of my county threshing committee.

3. I will discourage the tendency to rush threshing operations beyond the capacity of my machine.

4. If possible, I will use a large canvas under and around my machine in order that I may make a thorough grain-saving clean-up after each move.

5. I will insist on careful and regular feeding of the bundles (sheaves) to the machine and supervise my pitchers as much as possible so that they will avoid unnecessary shattering.

6. I will keep my engine in such condition that it will deliver the necessary power to keep the cylinders moving at the speed required by the manufacturers.

7. I will advise the making of shock rows so that no grain is left in the fields by the bundle wagons.

8. I will encourage the use of tight-bottom bundle racks so that grain will not shatter and be lost when it is hauled to the machine.

9. I will encourage the saving of grain, and if any wastage occurs which should be prevented, I will appeal to the county threshing committee, in cases where I can not adjust the matter myself.

"FERRY PILOTS" HAVE PERILOUS WORK ASSIGNED

BOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND Aug. 2.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—Several American airmen have recently been put on duty as special "ferry pilots" between England and France. This is a very important work, consisting mainly of taking new war airplanes over the Channel in all weathers to points where they are needed at the front.

The task is not difficult in fine weather, but in bad weather it is sometimes very difficult and dangerous. Where the weather is bad or good, the machines needed at the front must go without delay.

On a recent day, chilly and obscure, one of the American "ferry-men" was ordered to take a new scout fighter to an aerodrome close to the front lines in Northern France. The clouds were so low and the haze so pronounced that the far end of the flying ground was barely visible. The pilot thought that he might scrape thru by flying low and changing possible engine failure.

After he set off, he found matters even worse than he had thought. At 300 feet, objects below were scarcely visible; at 200 feet he could see nothing. He made a circuit of the aerodrome, and might have landed again, except that the American pilot has a distaste for admitting that anything is impossible.

He rose to 350 feet and was enveloped in a cloud. It was now too late to land, for he had lost the aerodrome, and if he were to come down to look for a good field he might hit a neighboring cliff or factory chimney. The only thing to do was to keep on his compass course, and climb up above the clouds and after flying for about half an hour to glide down gradually thru them and search for a land mark.

At 3,000 feet he found himself above the clouds and in the midst of morning sunshine. The half hour passed and the pilot had to make up his mind to dive back down thru the clouds.

The luck suddenly decided it in the shape of a small gap in the cloud thru which he caught a glimpse of the green fields of France. Without hesitation he shut off his engine and dived thru the gap. By good fortune the clouds here were higher than on the English side, but it was raining hard.

He switched on the engine again below the clouds and sailed along at a comparatively low altitude thru the rain, picking up land marks by which he chose his course. Thence it was comparatively plain sailing, and in a short time he landed at the depot aerodrome and housed his machine.
