

JAPANESE WILL INCREASE ARMY BY ONE HALF

TOKIO, JULY 20.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—Japan has made preliminary plans to increase her army 50 per cent and to build three times the number of dreadnaughts and battle cruisers previously planned.

No official announcement has been made but it is understood that the project adopted at a recent conference of field marshals and fleet admirals includes the creation of an army of 21 corps, or 42 divisions and the enlargement of the navy so that it will eventually include three main fleets, each to consist of eight dreadnaughts, an eight battle cruisers, instead of four, as at present.

Years will be required to develop the army and navy to the desired strength, but a beginning will be made as soon as conditions, especially financial conditions, will permit.

Under the new military program, Japan would have 126 regiments, as against the present 84, there being now in existence 21 divisions, each of four regiments. An increase of 42 regiments is provided for.

Of this increase, four new divisions are covered by the army program laid down in 1908 when it was decided to increase the number of not yet been carried into effect, of 100 regiments. This program has divisions to 25, or to a total strength of 125 divisions.

Writers on military matters estimate that the new plan contemplates an eventual enlargement of the Japanese army by 50 per cent above its present strength with a corresponding enlargement of the reserves due to the great numbers passed thru the service each year. Many think the expansion will be easy from the standpoint of man power.

ENEMY PLANES BROUGHT DOWN BY WHOLESALE

LONDON, Aug. 28.—During the past two weeks, 328 German airplanes have been destroyed and 134 others brought down out of control, Field Marshall Haig announced.

In the same period 594 tons of bombs were dropped on enemy objectives.

"Low flying airplanes yesterday machine gunned and bombed infantry, wagons and machine guns," the statement continues. "Co-operating with tanks, they silenced several batteries."

"A German aerodrome south of Toul was bombed and the hangars set on fire. Troops and transports near by were attacked with machine guns. One hostile airplane was shot down. All ours returned safely."

"Twenty-six tons of bombs were dropped during the day. Twelve hostile planes were destroyed, two shot down out of control, three brought down by fire from the ground, and four balloons destroyed. Four of our machines are missing. At night five tons of bombs were dropped. We had no losses at night."

HUGE TANKS PLOW UNDER FRENCH TOWN

LONDON, Aug. 28.—(British Wireless Service).—British tanks uprooted a whole French village to stop the fire of German machine guns from the houses, in the recent Allied offensive.

The French troops had been seriously hampered by the German machine guns in or on the tops of the houses. Tanks were in the vicinity and a message was sent to them for assistance. These complied, but the German machine guns were too well protected to be knocked out by the fire from tank guns. Accordingly the tank commanders conferred at the far end of the village and decided, in a hurried impromptu war council, to destroy the village by sheer weight of metal.

The tanks accordingly rammed house after house, bringing down the machine guns, extricating themselves from the ruins of one house, then proceeding to the next. In this way the village was captured without a single casualty, and at once occupied by the French.

In another attack a tank was set on fire, the officer in command was killed and the first driver severely wounded all within the German lines. The second driver extinguished the fire, assumed command and later in the day drove back, singlehanded, preceded by about 50 Germans, whom he had captured unaided.

Another tank, temporarily knocked out, constituted itself into a strong point inside the German lines and held out for five hours until the infantry arrived.

WILSON ADVOCATES FEDERAL POWER OWNERSHIP NOW

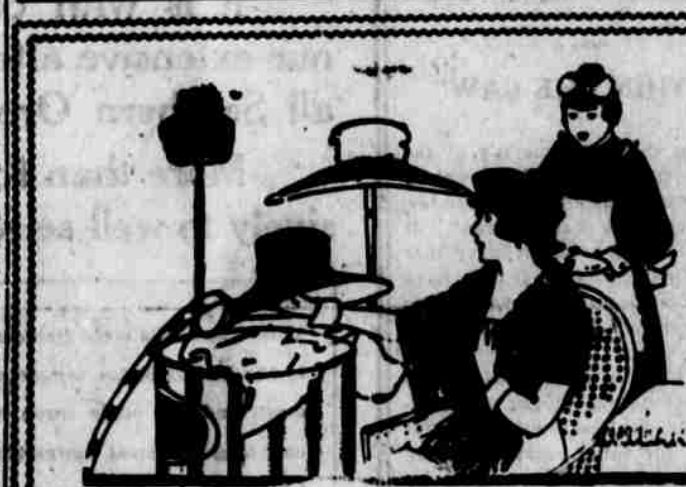
WASHINGTON, D. C. Aug. 28.—President Wilson is indicating a tendency to develop all water power in the public domain thru public ownership, instead of leasing as the present bill permits. The new bill giving the president the right to take over all or part of the product of any power plant, is said to be the forerunner of the government money, the necessary plants to utilize all water power on sites still in the public domain. It is known that he has talked with some members of congress on this subject and has indicated that the leasing plan, as proposed is not desired now because of the difficulty of mobilizing private capital for this purpose, without disturbing the war needs for all available funds, and where power development is needed, the indications are the president will urge that it be done by the government with government funds.

FORMER MERRILL PASTOR MOURNS DEATH OF WIFE

MERRILL, Aug. 28.—The sad news has been received of the death of Mrs. L. M. Anderson, wife of a former pastor of the Presbyterian church here, at her home in Myrtle Point, Oregon.

Rev. and Mrs. Anderson were connected with the church here for several years and, together with their six children, had many friends to whom the news of her untimely death came as a severe shock.

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ANCIENT ARMOR NOW REMODELED FOR AMERICANS

WASHINGTON D. C. Aug. 28.—Armor for the American soldiers—helmets, shields, and breastplates—is being modeled in the workshop of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, in New York City.

Comprising all that was best in the types of armor used in the days of the ancients this armor, in some instances, is being wrought into shape on ancient anvils and by hammers that were actually used centuries ago.

And in direct charge of the workshop is a French artisan whose skill has been known to collectors the world over and whose forebears, for generations back, have kept alive the dying trade of the armorer.

This war in Europe, which has brought back into use many discarded weapons and practices of medieval warfare, has found use for armor as well. This is shown in the adoption of steel helmets by all the warring powers; in the use of heavy breastplates by the Germans, and lighter breastplates for attack, by the English; in the armored waistcoats used by the Italians, and in trench shields which all the armies are using.
