MANY YANKEES ARE LOST SIGHT OF AT JUAREZ

JUAREZ, Mex., Aug. 29.—This is the port of missing men. Many Americans have crossed the shaky, wooden bridge to this little adobe town who have been never seen nor heard of again. The files of the United States consulate here are filled with letters from mothers, wives and other relatives asking for information about men who have disappeared somewhere in Mexico.

Many were killed fighting the various revolutionary forces during the six years of war. Others were murdered for their money on the Calle Diablo—Street of the Devil, or were killed by bandits who rove over the country enforcing the law of the six shooter. Still others are living out their lives in some mountain settlement under assumed names, often with native families.

Tom Kingsberry's name was the latest addition to the long list of those men missing in Mexico. Kingsberry was foreman of the Palomas Land and Cattle company, of Los Angeles. He left for an inspection of the cattle ranches west of here and has not been heard from since. Mexicans here whisper of a feud existing between the Palomas cowboys and Jose Ynes Salazar's band of outlaws. Salazar was killed at the headquarters ranch of the Palomas company. That was where Kingsberry disappeared a year later.

For months the body of an American swayed in the wind suspended from a telegraph pole at Rancharia, south of here. He was caught dynamiting bridges and hanged by the federal railroad guards. He was never identified. Many Americans are known to have been executed in the cemetery on the hill. Few were given an opportunity to notify their relatives.

Away at the rear in the woods cavalry horses can be seen reared while their riders wait the command to advance.

WAR HORSES EDUCATION IS PHENOMINAL

LONDON, Aug. 29.—A war horse, before he is ready for service, receives an education almost as rigorous and comprehensive as that of the recruit who rides him into battle. When properly trained he will face barbed wire and even rush entanglements, regardless of lacerated legs and flanks. After he has been accustomed to have a man mount rapidly on his sensitive back he is taught to kneel with the rider. He has to be taught to pull up his own length from a gallop, to stand steady while a rider fires from his back and to lie still on the ground while he is being used as a cover for his rider who snipes over his side.

One of the most difficult things required of a war horse is to become familiarized with the sword. In cavalry it is a common trick for a warrior to aim his first blow at his opponent's horse, for no horse will stand after being pricked on the nostril or lip.

When a horse knows his rider well he will perform surprising deeds. A brigade has been known to go thru three lines of bayonets and then thru a barbed wire entanglement. Not long ago a Canadian troop charged two lines of German machine guns and rifles, wheeled and then rode thru them a second time. When the enemy finally begins his big retreat it is the Allied horses that will keep the German on the run.
