

DRAFT CALLS HEARD FROM POLAR CIRCLE

JUNEAU, Alaska, Aug. 1.—Draft calls for men in the remote and far away sections of Alaska have brought youths out over many hard miles to report for service.

Hunters, trappers, traders and prospectors, in answer to the draft calls, have come from the tundra

country up along the Arctic, the hills and valleys along the Yukon River and the remote mountain sections of southeastern and southwestern Alaska. They have been mobilized at Alaska forts and later sent to the States for training.

One young man, Claude Harrison, received his draft questionnaire as he was making plans for spending the coming winter hunting and trapping in the Lake Minchumina country, about sixty miles northwest of Mt. McKinley.

Harrison immediately dropped his plans and set out on a 125 mile "mush" to the office of the United States commissioner at Kantishna. When he arrived he found the Commissioner had gone to Nenana, nearly 100 miles farther, so the long hike

was continued on until the official was found.

Twelve other young men, who gathered at Marshall, Alaska, to board a steamer for Nome, in answer to their calls, found on their arrival that on account of the slowness of the mails, they had failed to receive their notification in time and were classed delinquents. They were cleared of the charges when they explained the delay.

NEW PLAN FOR

FIRE PROTECTION

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 31.—Twenty four California counties have adopted a plan for county fire protection organization suggested by the University of California, according to an announcement from the university. In these counties 413 rural fire fighting companies, made up of 6600 individuals, are now fully organized.

Part of the equipment purchased at county expense includes 533 automobile trailers, fire extinguishers, and fire fighting tools. The activity of the county organizations, the university officials state, has been a remarkable lowering of fire losses.

"The protection of food, forage and forests from fire, urged by the farm advisers of California as a war time necessity," according to a statement of Ralph P. Merritt, United States food administrator for California, "has materially helped in making it possible to ship such enormous quantities of supplies from this state to our armies and our allies."

ENGLAND RESERVES

GRAIN FOR POULTRY

LONDON, Aug. 31.—Fifty thousand tons of cereals have been set aside by the British food ministry "for the preservation of the best breeds of English poultry." The selection of the fowls to be thus favored is to be made by local committees formed in various localities by poultry keepers.

NEW AUSTRIAN PREMIER HAS HEAVY TASK

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 31.—The new Austrian premier, Baron Dr. Max von Hunsdörfer-Hainlein, is described by the Vossische Zeitung's well-informed Vienna correspondent as "an Austrian fighter without the latter's parliamentary experience but with analogous political shading and adaptability." He was appointed premier July 28.

Von Hunsdörfer enters upon his task under peculiarly difficult circumstances. It is generally expected that they will sail in Germany's wake. "It could not be otherwise," German commentators put it, almost threateningly, although so far he has not made any binding declaration to that effect.

Von Hunsdörfer's appointment is largely attributed to clerical influence. He belonged to the late Archduke Francis Ferdinand's set, from which Emperor Charles already has chosen several ministers. It is therefore expected he will enjoy the support of Catholics.

To place the country's internal economic situation on something like a sound basis it is possible, will be Hunsdörfer's most difficult task. New taxation will be immediately required to meet the service of three and a half milliards on war debts and the reorganization of the disorganized food distribution system will be equally imperative. How he proposes to extract further revenue from the tax-ridden population is a secret as yet undisclosed.
