ket, string beans, tomatoes and corn are available for home canning or drying purposes and persons who wish to have vegetables for winter use are urged by the food administration to put up their own vegetables. Recipes for both canning and drying vegetables are on hand for distribution at the food administration office in the Northwestern Bank building.

THEY HATE TO DESTROY THIS GOOD LIQUOR

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 13.—Liquor seized by officers of the county sheriff's force here since a year ago last January is estimated in value at \$61,240. There are 17,080 pints, and the officers say the going price of whiskey among illicit salesmen here now is \$3 a pint. This amount is exclusive of that seized by the members of the city police department and dumped at frequent intervals into the sewer.

The county seizures of liquor, taken in connection with 170 arrests, most of them declared to be those of persons engaged in the wholesale handling of liquor, has been stored in the county jail, pending possible laws for disposing of it in some other manner than its destruction.

TIME BOUNDARIES MAY BE CHANGED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 13.—Proposed findings of the interstate commerce commission on time zones, following hearings by Commissioner Atchison in various parts of the country, have been announced. It is proposed to begin Pacific time on a line beginning at the north with the eastern boundary of the Blackfoot Indian reservation in Montana, extending south to Poehstello, Ogden, Salt Lake, the Utah-Nevada boundary and on by the Colorado river to the Mexican boundary.

This, if finally adopted, will iron out many of the zig-zag lines of time which now divide Mountain and Pacific time, made at the whim of the railroads, and containing many inconsistencies. In a general way it will shove Mountain time back for some distance in the Northwest where it has encroached and "saved" too much daylight.

The commission has set the daylight zone case for oral argument in Washington on October 1, having been charged with the duty of regulating the time zones on the railroads.

The commission has granted the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association the right to amend its complaint against the Southern Pacific so as to make Director General McAdoo a party to the complaint, and to include in its attack the 25 per cent increase in rates granted by the director general.

HUNS PREPARE TO RETREAT TO BELGIUM

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 13.—That the Germans are preparing for a great retreat into Central Belgium is indicated by information received here today.

The German military authorities have begun to build a chain of fortifications on the line Liege, Ghent and Bruges, and have started to remove the civilian population from the fortress of Maubeuge, in France.

Maubeuge is near the Belgian frontier. In the German advance into France in 1914, the Germans passed Maubeuge, but left an army around the place which afterwards captured it.

A series of defensive works on the line mentioned in the cablegram would extend from the German border to the North sea.

Sale of Timber Klamath Indian Reservation, Northern Spring Creek Unit.—Sealed bids, marked outside "Bid, Northern Spring Creek Timber," and addressed to the Superintendent of the Klamath Indian School Klamath Agency, Oregon, will be received until twelve o'clock noon, Pacific Time, Tuesday, October 1, 1918, for the purchase of timber upon about 2500 acres within Township 24 South, Range 7 East. The sale embraces approximately twenty-five million feet of yellow pine and one million feet of white fir. The cutting of white fir will be optional with the purchaser. Each bid must state for each species the amount per thousand feet Scribner decimal C. log scale that will be paid for all timber cut during the first two years of the contract period. Prices for the last two years of the contract period are to be fixed by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and are not to exceed, however, an increase of fifty cents per M. foot board measure for each species. No bid of less than three dollars and fifty cents per M. foot for yellow pine and fifty cents for white fir during the first period will be considered. Each bid must be submitted in duplicate and be accompanied by a certified check on a solvent national bank in favor of the Superintendent of the Klamath Indian School in the amount of \$5,000. The deposit will be returned if the bid is rejected but retained if the bid is accepted, and the required contract and bond are not executed and presented for approval within sixty days from such acceptance. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. For copies of the bid and contract forms and for other information application should be made to the Indian Superintendent, Klamath Agency, Oregon.
