GERMANY TIRED OF FIGHTING, SAYS HUN

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 16 .- "Despite the refusal of our peace offer and the violent criticism of the enemy press, I am convinced that peace is nearer than both sides suppose." Count von Hertling, the German chancellor, made this statement in an address before a delegation of trade union leaders, according to Berlin dispatches Friday. He asserted that both the government and the army leaders desired a peace by the understanding and were opposed to all idea of conquest.
