

# SPEAKER HAS VERY NOTABLE WAR RECORD

Major Jack Hamilton, who is coming to Klamath Falls with Louis J. Simpson next week, to speak in the interests of the Fourth Liberty Loan, has a very notable record.

He was born in New York and was in the British army for 14 years, serving in Malta, Gibraltar, India, England, Ireland and Scotland.

When the war started in 1914 he was in Paris and volunteered his services to the British government and was accepted. He witnessed the evacuation of Liege and Namur and took part in the retreat from the Mons and the battle of the Marne.

He received a shell shock in 1915 and was returned to the United States. On his recovery he offered his services to Washington. He was sent to Fort Sheridan and commissioned

a captain, and later promoted to major.

Major Jack Hamilton experienced a thrilling romance in France, having rescued a lady from the hands of the Huns in Northern France, which terminated in their marriage. Mrs. Jack Hamilton is of French birth and has lost all the members of her family. Her brothers died fighting for their beloved France, and her mother is either dead or a prisoner in the hands of the Germans at the present time, nothing having been heard of her since 1915.

## FULL QUOTA FOURTH LOAN MUST BE MET

(Continued from page 1)

Indian money amounting to \$80,000 would have been available. The Agency would have shown that able and Klamath County would have raised its quota if the committee had based its estimate of what was needed at \$78,000 additional. We had finally 1544 \$50 subscriptions which alone amounted to \$77,200 and would have been enough to finish our quota, leaving \$300, to raise among 1200 other subscribers. Or to put it another way, if the rating committee had fixed a flat quota of \$50 per man, the 2871 separate subscriptions finally made would have resulted in about \$143,550 over subscription. Of course no one would have suggested such a course, but the fact remains as stated.

This time your rating committee is working with the advantage of just such concrete facts as are stated above; for instance, with the knowledge that we had 1544 \$50 subscriptions in the Third Loan; 770 \$100 subscriptions, etc., all subscriptions being tabulated. We also know that the outside corporations and individuals who last time raised over \$100,000 for this county have announced that on the Fourth Loan they will subscribe only at their headquarters—and in fact we have only \$1,100 of outside money promised us up to

this date, September 16th. Indian funds, too, will not amount to over \$10,000 to \$15,000, as there is no great accumulation in these funds. This is exclusive, of course, of individual subscriptions by Klamath Indians of which many are expected this time, and were received last time.

## ONE AMERICAN TAKES EIGHTEEN GERMANS

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY ON THE LORRAINE FRONT, Sept. 16.—Eighteen German prisoners were brought in by Albert Hart of Brooklyn, and two of his pals. The Boches surrendered as soon as the Americans attacked north of Regnieville (to the west of Pont-A-Mousson).

The Huns came stumbling thru the mud, over the rough ground, with up-raised hands. Two of them fell into a shell hole, but quickly scrambled to their feet with their eyes and mouths full of mud. Their comrades could not help laughing at their ludicrous appearance.

William Colbridge of Detroit brought in six Germans, including one little fellow who was so burdened with extra boots and clothing that he begged Colbridge to make one of the other Huns help him to carry them.
