

ENEMY LOSING GROUND VERY RAPIDLY

SERBIANS CONTINUE CHASE OF BULGARS

ARE SECURING BIG AMOUNT OF WAR BOOTY IN SPITE OF TURKISH ATTEMPTS TO DESTROY SUPPLIES LEFT BEHIND

BRITISH GAIN TOWARD ST. QUENTIN—BIG ADVANCE IN PALESTINE—TURKISH PRISONERS GREATLY EXCEED 25,000.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—The Serbians continue to cross the river Vardar northeast of Monastir and are in contact with the Bulgarians, who are burning villages and stores of material. The Serbians, however, have captured great quantities of material around Prilep.

The Serbians are now on the Gradsjo Prilep road to the northeast, while to the southeast they have reached the steep massif of the Drenska mountain range.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—The British cavalry are pushing up the Mediterranean coast of Palestine and have occupied Haifa and Acre. The Turks east of the Jordan are withdrawing toward Amman on the Hedjas railway. The Australian, New Zealand, Jewish and other troops are pursuing the enemy and have reached Esalt, 15 miles northwest of Amman.

The total number of Turks taken prisoner will largely exceed the 25,000 already reported.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—The British are now pressing in on St. Quentin directly from the west. The British have made progress in the region east of Verdun.

On the front west of Cambrai and in the region north of Moeuvres the British positions have been improved.

In the Arras-Lens sector the Germans tried to drive the British from their new positions southeast of Gavrelle, but they were completely repulsed.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—The Anglo-Greek forces in the Doraia region have effected a junction with the Franco-Greeks to the west and continue to pursue the Bulgarians.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—The Anglo-Greeks in Macedonia have now reached Smokvitsa making an advance of ten miles up the Vardar River. They are now at Bazari, three miles north of Lake Doiran.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 24.—The following casualties are reported by the commanding general of the American Expeditionary Forces: Killed in action 121, Missing in action 24, Wounded severely 63, Died of wounds 21, Died from accident and other causes 3, Died of disease 5, Wounded, degree undetermined 3, Wounded slightly 3, Died from airplane accident 1, Prisoners 5.

The following Oregon men are listed: Privates Robert Bernar of Flora, and Archie C. Stannard, Lebanon, both killed in action.

AGED ARCHBISHOP AT POINT OF DEATH

ST. PAUL, Sept. 24.—Regaining consciousness for a few minutes now and then today, Archbishop John Ireland, who lies at the point of death in being kept alive by oxygen. He is 80 years of age and has rallied three times from seemingly fatal relapses.

MAN ARRESTED FOR SEDITIOUS DECLARATIONS

MAN RESIDING NEAR LAKEVIEW ALLEGED TO HAVE CALLED ALLIED NATIONS "SCUM OF THE EARTH"

A. E. Arbuster, declared by his captors to be a radical pro-German, was brought in yesterday by Marshal Frank T. Berry from Lakeview, where he was bound over to the grand jury by U. S. Commissioner Edison Watson and placed under bonds of \$5,000. He will be held in jail in Portland pending his investigation. He is declared to have asserted that the Allied nations are the scum of the earth and that Germany is the only country and that the German people are the only people. He came to this section in 1907 and has taken out no naturalization papers.

LABOR MATTERS TO BE SETTLED AT CONFERENCE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 24.—Steps toward the stabilizing of wage conditions during the war will be undertaken here at a conference tomorrow with the war and navy department officials, who will discuss the methods of enforcing labor agreement to be made between the government and the workmen and their employes. The plan will involve an agreement as to increase in wages of some low paid groups to a standard community or industry scale. A million women will be affected.

REGISTRATION RETURNS CORRECTED TODAY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 24.—Corrected figures for Oregon show the draft registration returns of 108,883 compared with the estimate of 84,404.

NEW REGULATIONS FOR ALIEN GERMAN WOMEN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 24.—Unnaturalized German women may not enter or live in homes within half a mile about camps or prohibited military institutions after October Fifth according to announcement today by Attorney General Gregory.

POOLE NOW AT HOUSINGPORTS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 24.—United States Consul General Poole has arrived at Housingports from Moscow. Secretary Lansing has ordered him to leave no more Americans there.

SEATTLE, Sept. 24.—The police are today searching for the bandit who held up the Northern Pacific train near Everett last night and escaped with several thousand dollars worth of registered mail.

NO N FOR THE LOAN

GIANT LIBERTY LOAN MEETING THIS EVENING

PARTY IN YELLOW DEMON CAR WILL REACH CITY FROM LAKEVIEW THIS AFTERNOON. FINE SPEAKING TONIGHT

Another big patriotic gathering in this city will be held this evening at the Opera House when Judge J. H. Stephenson and his party of Liberty Loan Speakers will address the citizens on the great questions of the day. The party is expected in this afternoon in the big "Demon Car" from Lakeview and will spend the time from now until Thursday at the disposal of the Local Committee, in the interests of the coming Loan. Some mighty interesting pertinent facts and valuable "inside" information is expected to be given out this evening. Every loyal citizen of Klamath Falls and surrounding country should be present.

The big yellow car is on its second tour of the state in support of the boys over in France. It was sent out by Eric V. Hauser of the Multnomah hotel during the second Liberty loan, and on its return Mr. Hauser presented the car to the Red Cross. That organization held a bazaar about that time and the car was sold for \$10,000. It is now the property of Mrs. R. H. Stewart. That lady has generously donated the use of the car for the present tour, and Mr. Hauser will again pay all its expenses, as well as those of the party.

Manager Klepper says that the "Million Dollar Special", as the auto is sometimes called, will carry a billion dollars' worth of pep and enthusiasm for the loan and that the visit here of the Hauser party will warrant declaring a half holiday in the city and vicinity.

WANT ALLIED ANSWER SPREAD OVER GERMANY

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 24.—America's answer to Austria-Hungary's recent peace note and the speech of Premier Clemenceau of France on the same subject should, according to the Lokal Anzeiger of Berlin, be posted on bill boards and be communicated to the German people by the distribution of millions of pamphlets. "No German man or woman who knows the contents and significance of these declarations," the newspaper declares, "can doubt that peace is attainable only either thru our victory or at the price of our utter destruction."

NIGHT SCHOOL WILL OPEN ON MONDAY NIGHT

Night school at the Klamath county high school will open Monday evening September 30th at 7:30 o'clock for an 18 week term. Work in the following subjects will be offered: Beginning Gregg shorthand, advanced Gregg shorthand, bookkeeping, penmanship, typewriting and commercial correspondence. Night school is designed primarily for those persons who cannot avail themselves of the day privileges. Persons already enrolled in the day school work will not be accepted for night school enrollment until others are accommodated. No tuition is charged. The only expense incident to attendance is the expense of text books, practice paper, etc. In general, the best work done by night school students has been done by those who concentrate on one or two subjects, and who make it a point not to miss any of the sessions. Regularity of attendance, perseverance, concentration and practice are absolutely essential to success of the subjects offered. Blanks will be ready for the registration of students on Monday evening, September 30 at 7:00 o'clock at the High School building, at which time all who contemplate attendance should be on hand. The regular sessions will be on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evenings of each week from seven to nine o'clock. Any additional information may be obtained upon application to the principal at the High School building.

BABY BONDS MUST NOT BE SIDETRACKED

Klamath County will have to buy a thousand dollars worth of War Saving Stamps a day between now and the close of the year if the county is going to keep up its pledge to the nation and meet its quota by the end of the year according to County Chairman J. W. Siemens, who states that approximately \$116,000 worth of the stamps have been purchased here up to the present time. The County Quota is \$222,000, leaving \$122,000 to be raised in the remaining three months of the year. Citizens must wake up to the necessity of aiding the government in this very important branch of government aid. Klamath must not be allowed to fall down in his end of the work after the fine record she has made in other patriotic moves.

FLAMES FORCE STATESMEN OUT IN "NIGHTIES"

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 24.—Fire in the New Willard hotel today caused a damage of \$100,000 and sent many guests of national prominence hurrying to safety. Vice-president and Mrs. Marshall, senators, diplomats scantily clad, dashed down the stairs, several women fainting and one tried to leap from the third floor, but was restrained.

DISASTER THREATENS ENEMY IN THE EAST

ALLIES VICTORIOUS OVER BOLSHEVIKI FORCES—BIG ADVANCE MADE

DEFEAT OF CENTRAL POWERS MAY HAVE FAR REACHING RESULTS

(By Associated Press) DATELESS DISPATCH—The Allied offensive on all fronts are progressing successfully. The disaster now threatening the Teutonic armies in Macedonia may change the whole complexion of affairs in the Balkans.

In the far east the Allies have been victorious over the Bolsheviki and Austrian prisoners of war. The Allies have taken Blagovestchenok on the Amur river. They have moved 125 miles eastward since taking Chita and have occupied the city of Nerzhinsk.

DESK SOLDIERS SENT OVERSEAS

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Sept. 24.—Limited service men are to be taken overseas for the American Expeditionary force and in order to conserve the man power of the nation, every fit man who is physically fit for combat service overseas is to be used solely for that purpose, according to a letter from the adjutant general's office announcing the new war department policy received here.

All bureaus of the war department are ordered to immediately take appropriate measures to provide for the maximum use of limited service men in the overseas service supply. All organizations for the service of supplies overseas may take such limited service men as the commanding officer of the organization concerned certifies will not be prevented by his physical defects from the proper performance of his duties. The new policy is taken to indicate that many men now in the quartermaster corps and other organizations of like character, who are physically fit for combat service will be sent overseas and limited service men called in the draft to take their places.
