

Industrial Honor Pennant for Liberty Loan Buyers



This is a reproduction of the industrial honor pennant—red border, four blue stripes and the percentage in red. This will be used thruout the United States in the Fourth Liberty Loan Campaign.

It is a new development upon the community honor flag. All business firms or organizations will have an honor roll and when 75 per cent, or more of their employees or members have subscribed to the loan they will be furnished a card or emblem for display in their windows, this emblem to indicate the percentage of employees of the firm or organization that have purchased Liberty Bonds.

CLAIM OFFER NOT CAUSED THRU DEFEAT

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 9.—An elucidation of the peace offer of the central powers is published by the Vienna newspapers. The article, which is explained as emanating from "well informed circles" reads as follows:

"It is first to be emphasized that this step by Austria Hungary, Turkey and Germany is not to be regarded as a decision taken suddenly under stress of military events. It constitutes rather in the history of our peace policy the last link in the chain of a logical and continual evolution, regard being paid at the same time to the latest internal political developments in Germany.

"As is known, the point of departure of our peace policy was Baron Burian's note of December, 1916. The step then asked was of a very vague character. The conditions were not described but only indicated in broad lines.

"In the course of the development the conditions have become crystallized. During February, March and April expressions regarding a general and just peace without annexations or compensation came into currency.

"Subsequently the idea of establishing an international court of arbitration and a reduction of armament was discussed and further, the principle of freedom of the seas was proclaimed, and finally, the principle was set forth that economic wars and economic oppression after the war must be prevented. Out of these guiding principles arose the present peace program.

"All these points, it will be recalled, were accepted by Count Czernin (former Austrian foreign minister), in speeches and interviews as a suitable basis for peace negotiations, and finally received the approval of the German reichstag so that uniformity in the conception of the allies (Ten-tonic) thereby found expression.

"Then followed the peace note of Pope Benedict, whose proposals and fundamental ideas were accepted by us as forming an acceptable basis. Only President Wilson in his note of January 8, 1918, in his 14 points, made proposals and proclaimed principles which substantially accorded with the program of the central powers.

MUNITION WORKERS ASKED FROM STATE

PORTLAND, Oct. 9.—Oregon will be called upon to supply munition plant workers to help make up the loss by the destruction of the Gillette plant at Morgan, N. J. How many men will be required from this state is not mentioned in advice received by John K. Kollock, secretary of the State Council of Defense, but Franklin K. Lane, chairman of the field division of the Council of National Defense, announced that existing munition factories are now short 189,000 unskilled laborers, and greater numbers are needed for army construction work.

HUN LEADER IS IN FAVOR OF WILSON TERMS

LONDON, Oct. 9.—In announcing to the Reichstag, his action in making his peace overtures with the Allied Powers, Prince Maximilian, the new German Chancellor said:

"Supported by the consent of all duly authorized persons in the empire, and by consent of all our Allies acting in concert with us, I sent on the night of October 4-5 thru the mediation of Switzerland, a note to the President of the United States, in which I requested him to take up the bringing about of Peace and to communicate to this end with all the belligerent states.

"The note will reach Washington today or tomorrow. It is directed to the president of the United States because he, in his message to congress January 8, 1918 and in his later proclamations, particularly in his New York speech of September 27, proposed a program for a general peace which we can accept as a basis for negotiations.

"I have taken this step not only for the salvation of Germany but its allies, but of all humanity, which has been suffering for years thru the war.

"I have taken it also because I believe the thoughts regarding the future well being of the nation which were proclaimed by Mr. Wilson are in accord with the general ideas cher-

ished by the new German government and with that of the overwhelming majority of our people. So far as I am personally concerned, in earlier speeches to other assemblies my hearers will testify that my conception which I hold of future peace has undergone no change since I was entrusted with the leadership of the empire's affairs.

Prince Maximilian sent a telegram to Baron Burian, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, saying:

"The glorious deeds of our armies and the determination of our peoples to defend themselves in loyal cooperation with their governments will, with God's help, lead us to an honorable peace."
