REPLY IS RECEIVED SATURDAY NIGHT BY UNOF FICIAL CHANNELS—MOVE IS AGREEMENT WITH REICHSTAG MAJORITY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct 14.—The German govern-ment, in reply to the recent note sent by President Wilson, accepts the terms laid down by the President in his address of January 8th and subsequent addresses.

The text of the German reply was received Saturday night thru unofficial channels.

The note says the responsibility for this step toward peace has been formed by conferences, and is in agreement with the great majority of the reichstag, and that the German government, in accordance with the AustroHungarian government, agrees to comply with the proposition of President Wilson in regard to the evacuation of President Wilson in the President Wilson in regard to the evacuation of President Wi occupied territories.

The text of the note follows:

"In reply to the questions of the President of the United San Francisco only this week. States of America, the German government hereby declares that the German government has accepted the terms laid down by President Wilson in his address of January 8th, and in subsequent addresses, on the foundation of permanent peace of justice consequent.

"Its object in entering into discussion would be only to agree upon practical details of application of these terms. The German government, in accordance with the Austro Hungarian government, for the purpose of bringing about an armistice, declares itself ready to comply with the prop-ositions of the President in regard to evacuation.

"The present German government, which has under-taken the responsibility for this step towards peace, has been formed by conferences and is in agreement with the great majority of the reichstag.

"The chancellor is supported in all of his actions by the will of the majority. He speaks in the name of the German government and of the German people."
