Turks Modeled Tortures On Spanish Inquisition

To wring confessions from the Armenians which would "justify" their subsequent massacres, the Turks resorted to wholesale and systematic torture. Ambassador Henry Morgenthau, in an article just published in the "World's Work", repeats a conversation he had with a Turkish official which reveals the incredible ferocity of that government in its deliberate campaign to exterminate the Armenian race: "One day I was discussing these proceedings with a responsible Turkish official, who was describing the tortures inflicted," says Mr. Morgenthau. "He made no secret of the fact that the government had investigated them, and, like all Turks of the official classes, he enthusiastically approved this treatment of the detested race. This official told me that all these details were matters of nightly discussion at the headquarters of the Union and Progress Committee. Each new method of inflicting pain was hailed as a splendid discovery, and the regular attendants were constantly ransacking their brains in the effort to devise some new torment. He told me that they even delved into the records of the Spanish Inquisition and other historic institutions of torture and adopted all the suggestions found there. He did not tell me who carried off the prize in this gruesome competition, but common reputation thruout Armenia gave a pre-eminent infamy to Djedvet Bey, the Vali of Van. All thru this country Djedvet was generally known as the "horsehoof of Baskkala" for this connoisseur in torture had invented what was perhaps the masterpiece of all—that of nailing horse-shoes to the feet of his Armenian victims. The examination would often begin with bastinado. This is a form of torture not uncommon in the Orient; it consists of beating the soles of the feet with a thin rod. At first the pain is not marked; but as the process goes slowly on, it develops into the most terrible agony, the feet swell and burst and not infrequently, after being submitted to this treatment, they have to be amputated. The gendarmes would bastinado their Armenian victim until he fainted; they would then revive again. If this did not succeed in bringing their victim to

Subscriptions Must Be Paid In Advance

In compliance with the ruling of the pulp and paper section of the War Industries Board regarding the conservation of newsprint paper, all subscriptions must be paid for in advance before delivery can be made. Following is the new ruling of the War Industries Board, Washington, D. C., with reference to subscriptions: "Discontinue sending papers after date of expiration of subscription, unless subscription is renewed and paid for." This ruling is now in effect. We ask your patriotic co-operation with us in complying with this war-time measure of our government by paying the carrier boys promptly when they call the first of the month. Otherwise, we have no discretion in the matter but to discontinue the paper. Beginning November 1st, carriers will collect for the paper for the current month in advance, instead of for the month past, as has been the custom.
