

REPUBLICANS WIN SWEEPING VICTORY

BIG MAJORITY IN NATION AND STATE

REPUBLICANS CLAIM MAJORITY OF FIVE OR SIX IN THE SENATE AND SAFE MAJORITY IN THE HOUSE—SPEAKER IN DOUBT

HENRY FORD IS DEFEATED BY NEWBERRY—RACE FOR GOVERNOR OF NEW YORK IS CLOSE. "UNCLE JOE" CANNON RE-ELECTED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 6.—Republicans gained seats in both houses of congress, and claim safe majorities in both places. Democrats admit some losses, but claim that they still retain control.

Speaker Champ Clark is running a very close race with B. H. Dyer, republican. Clark is leading slightly.

Senator Weeks, republican, was beaten in Massachusetts by former Governor Walsh, democrat.

Henry Ford, democrat, is apparently beaten in Michigan by Truman H. Newberry, the republican candidate.

Senator James Hamilton Lewis was beaten by Medill McCormick, the republican candidate, in Illinois.

Governor Capper of Kansas, republican, beat Senator Thomas, democrat. Joseph Cannon was returned to the lower house from Illinois. Senator Saulsbury, democrat, Delaware, is apparently beaten by former Senator Ball, republican.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—Governor Stephens is leading Theo. Bell, democrat, by 20,000.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Republican national headquarters issued a statement this afternoon, claiming a majority of at least five, and possibly six, in the United States senate.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—The republican national committee claimed safe majorities in both houses today. It is declared that fifty republican senators and 230 representatives were elected, with good prospects of larger majorities.

The democratic national committee claimed that the senate was democratic by at least one, and also claimed a small margin of democrats in the lower house.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Early this morning it is not apparent who controls congress. The governorship of New York is so close between Governor Whitman and Alfred Smith, democrat, that the soldier vote may decide it.

Senator Weeks of Massachusetts and Senator Lewis of Illinois and Senator Saulsbury of Delaware, all were defeated.

Senator Clark is running very close to his republican opponent. Representative Sherley of Kentucky, democrat, was beaten.

Henry Ford is running far behind Newberry, republican. Folk of Missouri has been defeated by Judge Spence, republican, for the senate.

Joseph Cannon was re-elected as representative from Illinois.

All socialist candidates in New York were beaten, but Victor Berger of Milwaukee, was elected.

All women candidates for congress were beaten.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 6.—Apparently not a single democrat was elected in Idaho.

TOPEKA, Nov. 6.—The entire republican ticket is believed elected in Kansas.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Both the Times and the World concede that the republicans will control congress. The Times claims a majority of four in the senate and nineteen in the lower house.

STRUBLE TO BE NEXT MAYOR OF KLAMATH FALLS

BEATS E. M. CHILCOTE BY FIVE VOTES IN NECK AND NECK RACE—NEW CITY TREASURER CHOSEN

I. R. Struble was elected mayor of Klamath Falls yesterday by the very narrow majority of five votes, according to the best figures available today. His next competitor, E. M. Chilcote, was so close that the result was in doubt until the last vote was counted. The vote stands as follows:

I. R. Struble 420, E. M. Chilcote 415, A. J. Lyle 168.

Miss Ida Momyer was conceded the choice as city treasurer with a good majority over Captain J. W. Siemens, altho the exact figures were not obtainable. The following councilmen were elected:

Joseph Moore, First Ward; Frank M. Upp, Second Ward; C. K. Brandenburg, Third Ward; Chas. Colvin, Fourth Ward.

INCOMPLETE RETURNS GIVE G. O. P. CONTROL

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Republicans have reversed the democratic control of the house, according to incomplete returns at 3 o'clock today. Both parties are claiming the senate. Indications of a close vote and possibly a tie, in which event the Vice President would cast the deciding vote.

The republicans have apparently seated 225 representatives, and the democrats 191. Each party has 45 senators. Six contests are undecided. Three republicans are leading and three democrats.

DEMOCRAT LEADS FOR NEW YORK GOVERNOR.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Smith, Democrat is leading Whitman, Republican for Governor by thirty-two thousand, according to the latest reports, with 436 districts still to come.

U. S. TRADE INCREASING IN VOLUME

For the sixth time during the present year the value of the imports of merchandise for the current month has exceeded those for the corresponding month of any previous year, and for the fourth time this year the value of the exports for the current month has exceeded those for the corresponding month of any previous year.

Imports for September were \$283,000,000, an increase of nearly \$25,000,000 over September, 1917, but a decrease of \$10,000,000 from August this year. For the nine months ending September, 1918, the imports were \$2,229,000,000, an increase of \$40,000,000 over the corresponding period of 1917.

Exports for September amounted to \$550,000,000, an increase of nearly \$100,000,000 over September, 1917, and \$20,000,000 over August, 1918. Exports for the nine months were \$4,561,000,000, a slight decrease as compared with last year, but an increase of \$610,000,000 over the corresponding period of two years ago.

OPPORTUNITY FOR ENTERING RADIO SERVICE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—Men skilled in trades and high school graduates who want to take a course of training as radio operators are offered an opportunity for duty overseas in the United States air service if they make application immediately.

These men may be qualified either for general or limited service provided they later are fit for overseas duty.

General military service men, Class 1-A, registrants of September 12 may be inducted. General military service men, Class 1-A, registrants prior to September 12 cannot be inducted although men in deferred classification because of dependency may be inducted.

Further information may be obtained from Air Service Trade Test Boards at 711 Santa Fe Building, San Francisco; Chamber of Commerce, Los Angeles, or Chamber of Commerce, Seattle, Wash.

Men needed include: Airplane, mechanics, airplane riggers, auto body builders, balloon riggers, blacksmiths, cabinet makers, camera repairmen, carpenters, chauffeurs, cobblers, cooks, coppersmiths, electricians, engine repairmen, engine testers, lathe workers, etc., who could qualify as armers, men with mechanical training, men with photographic experience, fabric workers, ignition repairmen, instrument repairmen, machinists, metal workers, motorcyclists, motor mechanics, packers, painters, propeller workers, stenographers, tailors, truckdrivers, vulcanizers, High school graduates with no radio experience desiring to take course of training for radio operators at Air Service School.

VOLCANO SPOUTS IN HAWAII.

HONOLULU, (T. H.), Nov. 6.—Spouting 100 feet from new cracks in the old crater floor Saturday morning, lava flows of the volcano Kilauea entirely buried the old rest house.

OREGON GOING REPUBLICAN BY HEAVY MARGIN

WITHYCOMBE, AND McNARY AND OTHER CANDIDATES LEADING OPPOSITIONS MORE AND MORE AS RETURNS COME IN.

PORTLAND, Nov. 6.—Scattering returns give an indication of election entire republican ticket. McNary is now leading west by 515. In Multnomah County it is estimated that McNary leads outside of Portland, if ratio keeps up will be twenty thousand.

Withycombe is leading Pierce in Multnomah County by 266 and has an estimated majority outside of Portland of eighteen thousand. Withycombe's and McNary's leads outside Portland greater than here.

Incomplete returns from the whole State on Supreme Judgeship gives Bennett 1969, Campbell, 685, Cole 1087, Olson 1148.

Sinnott, Hawley and McArthur, elected Representatives.

PORTLAND, Nov. 6.—Apparently an entire Republican ticket has been elected. McNary's majority is apparently greater than Withycombe's on early returns.

Congressmen Sinnott, Hawley and McArthur were re-elected. West sent telegram congratulating McNary today. Supreme Judgeship close with Bennett, apparently leading.

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 5.—(Correspondent Associated Press)—Whether the German food supply is sufficient to last for another year of war is being debated in German newspapers with signs of apprehension.

"Calculations warrant the belief that we can hold out, provided the most stringent measures are taken to regulate clandestine traffic in food," says the Cologne Volkszeitung. Its estimate is based on figures showing the German food supply collected by Stegerwald, a member of the Prussian diet.

"Nevertheless," adds the paper, "Stegerwald's figures show that we have a single position also at home." The significance of this lies in the fact that the Siegfried position on the western front went down before Allied attacks.

After endeavoring to bolster up the waning confidence of the Germans, the Volkszeitung says: "Meat distribution must be further curtailed. Cattle have decreased 3,000,000 head, compared with last year, while the number of pigs has been very seriously reduced. Meatless days must be maintained and consumption of game and poultry placed under much more severe control. Measures must be devised whereby all classes will be treated alike, and clandestine slaughter be ruthlessly suppressed."

"The Ukraine remains a doubtful factor, and from Rumania next year only corn is exportable, but both countries are able to export different kinds of foodstuffs."

DELEGATION OF HUNS TO NEGOTIATE WITH FOCH

SHERMAN STATEMENT SAYS DELEGATION ON WAY TO WENT FRONT TO CONCLUDE ARMISTICE—PARTY STARTED TODAY

GERMANS NOW RAISING NEGOTIATING FROM WESTERN FRONT. ALLIES HAVE REACHED AN AGREEMENT AND TAKEN 200 POWS

SHERMAN, Nov. 6.—An official statement today says: "German delegation to conclude an armistice and take up peace negotiations has left for the western front."

PARIS, Nov. 6.—As a result of the latest battle, which is still progressing, the allies have captured about 140 German divisions and 100,000 prisoners of war.

They have also taken thousands of prisoners. The enemy's position, which was bad before, may now be considered desperate.

(By Associated Press) Summary—Faced to a realization of impending peril by the progress of the British southeast of Valenciennes and by the French and American south of Sedan, Germany's shattered armies are rapidly retreating from the Belgian frontier to the Aisne River.

The Germans are apparently not carrying out the orderly retreat that marked their withdrawals from the Marne and the Somme. Vast quantities of munitions are being captured.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 6.—Germany has demanded the withdrawal of all Russian representatives in Germany. German representatives in Russia have been recalled.

DEATH CLAIMS YOUNG MOTHER THIS MORNING

Mrs. Florence L. Cleveland, wife of Chester A. Cleveland of the United States Reclamation Service here, passed away at her home at 115 Conky Street this morning at a few minutes past six o'clock. Mrs. Cleveland's untimely death was due to a complication of troubles.

The deceased was born in Massachusetts, September 26th, 1883 and removed here from Boston several months ago. She leaves four children besides her husband in her immediate family. A large number of friends have gathered at her home to pay their last respects.

The funeral will be held at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning at the residence of Mrs. Cleveland, 115 Conky Street. Burial will be in the cemetery at 11 o'clock.
