Imports for September were \$363. 000,000, an increase of mearly \$26,-000,000 over September, 1917, but

decrease of \$19,000,000 from August this year. For the nine months ending September, 1918, the import were \$3,333,000,000, an increase of \$40,000.000 over the correspo ading period of 1917.

Exports for September amounted to \$550,000,000, an increase of nearly \$100,000,000 over September, 1917,


