KLAMATH IS RESPONDING TO WAR CALL

Canvassers for the United War Drive, which starts over the Nation today, were on the streets early this morning, and from reports given out from those at the head of the move, the most generous response from the local public is indicated.

The pressing need of the funds which are now being raised is pointed out in a message from Henry F. Davidson, chairman of the American Red Cross, who has just spent five weeks in Europe, in support of the United War Work campaign.

Davidson's telegram reads: "Having spent nearly five weeks among our men along back of lines in England, France and Italy, I have had opportunity to observe work of seven relief organizations. Certainly every chapter of American Red Cross within the United States, and indeed, in all other parts of the world, and all citizens of the United States would contribute to work of the seven organizations if they could appreciate its importance. Our nearly two million men are far from home, in strange lands, and need, as men never needed before, just the things the seven organizations supply. I am therefore, confident the entire Red Cross, conscious of its obligation, will co-operate with enthusiasm and zeal in the coming campaign."

FRANCE LOOKS TO UNCLE SAM FOR HELP NOW

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—France, after the war, will expect to have help from the United States in the form of labor, money, materials and ships. This was made plain by Andre Tardieu, French high commissioner and minister of Franco-American war affairs in the French cabinet.

Tardieu, in an address to the Association of French Correspondents, said he hoped American troops would relieve the labor situation. He suggested that American technical units or other soldiers with their equipment would be able to help restore devastated France while awaiting transportation home.

WANTS WOMEN AT THE PEACE TABLE

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, suffrage worker, believes women should have seats at the peace table. As president of the National Woman Suffrage Alliance, she has sent a communication to all National women's organizations urging them to stand together to have women adequately represented on the peace commission.
