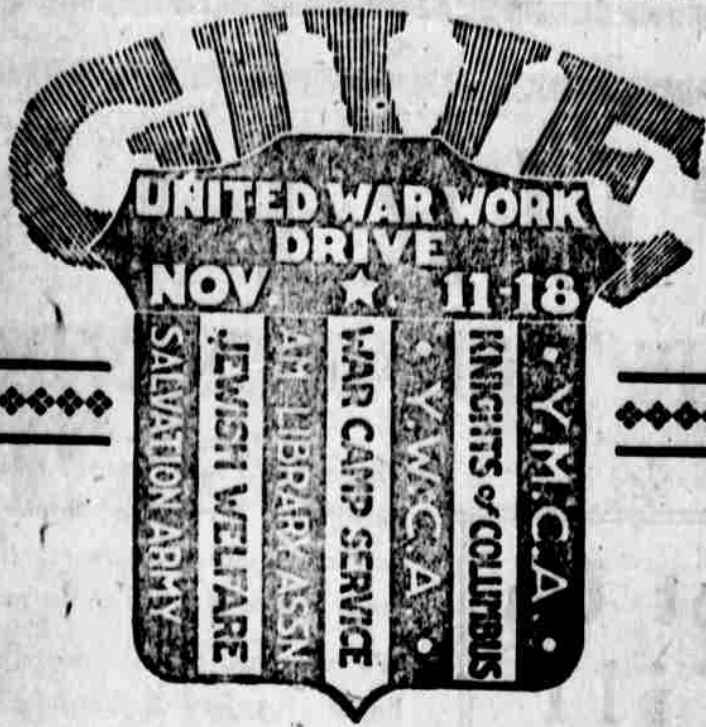




When They Get Through Fighting--That's When We Can Help the Most

HUNS PLAN TO GET TRADE OF BALKAN STATES

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 13.—Ever since the Russian collapse Germany has been laying the foundation for commercial conquest of the Baltic provinces of Courland, Lithuania, and Estonia. It is probable that she already has obtained an economic advantage there that will be difficult to wrest from her.

paign is in the hands of the "Eastern Territories" Neo-German Economic Society. Among the active leaders of this society are the Prussian and Imperial ministers, representatives of the military authorities in the Baltic provinces, members of the German Reichstag and bankers. Plans have been adopted for extending credit for the work of reconstruction and economic conquest, and the German Eastern Bank of Commerce and Industry, an institution whose turnover last year exceeded twenty-six billion marks, has planned to devote the greater share of its activities to work in the east.

A large number of organizations for the study of conditions in the Baltic provinces and for the "education of leaders of enterprise" there have already been formed. The "Ger-

man Association for Research in Eastern Europe" is in full action. Directors of the Deutsche Bank are taking an active part in the work.

Professors at the University of Berlin have organized an "Institute for Russian Research," and their activities extend to financial, commercial and industrial matters. Munich and Jena professors will shortly open a higher institute of learning "for the education of leaders of enterprise in the Eastern territories."

In the Baltic Provinces themselves there are already in operation special teachers' institutes and schools devoted to the development of the lands economic life. All these are, of course, supported by German funds and manned largely by German scholars and experts in the various lines of thought and activity.
