War Will Cost U. S. About Twenty Billion

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—The cost of the war to the American people is approximately \$20,000,000,000, leaders of the house ways and means committee and the senate finance committee estimated, following conferences with Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo.

The total appropriations made in the two war sessions of the 65th congress to carry until June 30, 1919, amount to \$57,000,000. Of this amount practically \$27,000,000 has been saved thru the sudden collapse of the war, Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo estimated.

Thirty billions will have gone out of the treasury for war purposes by the end of the present fiscal year, but this amount includes the \$10,000,000,000, the total American loans to the allies will reach by June 30. To date war expenditures have amounted to \$20,000,000,000, including \$2,000,000,000 in loans to the allies, treasury figures show. Expenses for the first three of the present fiscal year were \$2,000,000,000, but these are expected to lessen materially during the year's remaining months. Congressional leaders estimate that expenditures during the remainder of the year will amount to \$2,000,000,000.

Figures compiled by members of the senate finance committee today show that the government collected \$4,000,000,000 in taxes for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1918, and will collect \$4,000,000,000 under the pending revenue bill—a total of \$10,000,000,000.

The proceeds of the first four Liberty loans have amounted to \$17,000,000,000 and of an additional loan to be floated in the spring will amount to \$5,000,000,000—a total of \$22,000,000,000. By bonds and taxation the United States will have raised by July 1, 1919, \$22,000,000,000.

The \$10,000,000,000 loaned to the allies will be returned to the United States in due course of time. This leaves an expenditure of \$20,000,000,000 as the total cost of the war.

SEA ARMISTICE IS CONCLUDED SUCCESSFULLY

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The meeting of the German naval delegates with the British naval representatives took place on Friday afternoon off Rosyth, on the coast of Scotland. The German representatives consist of three delegates from the sailors and soldiers council and four delegates from the peoples council, including Rear Admiral von Meurer.

The surface warships which have been surrendered were to be "ready to leave Germany ports seven days after the signing of the armistice." That was yesterday.

The submarines which have been surrendered must "be prepared to leave Germany ports immediately on the receipt of a wireless order to sail to the port of surrender," and are to be handed over "with full complement in a port specified by the Allies and the United States within fourteen days after the signing of the armistice. That is Monday, November 25.

All the submarines are to be surrendered, and of the surface warships ten battleships, six battle cruisers, eight light cruisers and fifty destroyers of the most modern type are to be given up.

The ten battleships which it would be natural to select are the Kronprinz Wilhelm and Bayern, both new dreadnoughts, completed since 1916; the Markgraf, Konig and Grosser Kurfurst of the Konig dreadnought class, completed in 1914 and 1915; and the Kaiser, Kaiserin, Prinzregent Luitpold, Konig Albert, Friedrich der Grosse, all dreadnoughts of the Kaiser class, completed in 1912 and 1913.

Five battle cruisers, the Derfflinger, Hindenburg, Seydlitz, Moltke and Von der Tann, are apparently all that Germany has.

The armistice terms stipulate for the surrender of six.

Sight of the most recent light cruisers are the Brummer, Bremen, Karlsruhe, Pillau, Frankfurt, Nuernberg, Meiss and Dresden.

It is only if neutral ports are not available that the German warships are to be brought for surrender to allied ports. But there is reason to believe that since the armistice was signed the neutral powers have made it clear that their ports are not likely to be available for the intended purpose, and there is no doubt that the surrendered German warships will be brought to allied ports.

Surface warships which are left will be concentrated in one or more of the German ports. They will be kept off and completely disarmed, and will be under the supervision of a commission of surveillance appointed for the purpose by the associated powers.

Regarding the German submarines which had before the revolutionaries and took refuge in Swedish waters, there is no doubt they will have to be surrendered.

Regarding the Black Sea Arrangements are now being made for the surrender of all ships in German hands. It seems now to be practically certain that they will be surrendered without trouble.

Leader of Marines Dead
